NJLP MEMBERSHIP GROWTH

The January membership report of national LP Secretary Gary Johnson shows that the New Jersey Libertarian Party grew another five percent last year, and had 769 dues-paying members as of December 31, 1997. It is the first post-presidential election year growth in NJLP history. We are now the tenth largest state affiliate (down from ninth last year), and can seat a record thirty-nine delegates—out of 1214 altogether—at this year's national convention in Washington, DC. As one of the ten largest affiliates, the NJLP will also award a seat on the national Platform Committee. The delegate seats and Platform Committee seat will all be filled at the NJLP Convention on March 15.

The NJLP's growth, however, wasn't enough to avoid being overtaken by the Ohio Libertarian Party, which surged from eleventh place in 1996 to seventh as of this past New Year's Eve. Ohio has the seventh largest population, while New Jersey has the ninth. The State of Washington is the only state smaller than New Jersey which has a larger LP affiliate. Washington has the sixteenth largest population, but the eighth largest LP affiliate.

NJLP Chair Len Flynn said that an end-of-the-year direct mail recruitment drive, mailed on December 4th, saved the NJLP from actually losing members in what was otherwise its biggest year yet. The drive included efforts from Mike Buoncristiano, Betty Florentine,

Elizabeth Macron, Lou Stefanelli, and Jack Toussaint, but especially new Recruitment and Membership Officer Don Imbriale, who coordinated and supervised the effort. As we go to press, the current membership is 777.

The averted membership loss was apparently the result of party officers and activists devoting their time to the Sabrin Campaign, leaving much routine party business—like mailing renewal notices—unattended.

Imbriale, of Andover Township, Sussex County, took over as NJLP Database Manager and Recruitment and Membership Officer in October 1997. He says that his goal is to bring the NJLP up to 1000 members, and he is in the process of preparing and sending a series of mailings to recruit the requisite 223 new members.

REMEMBER – YOU HEARD IT FROM LIBERTARIANS FIRST

The February issue of World Press Review (moderate liberal) featured an article entitled "The Lost War on Drugs." Subtitled "New gangs emerge to satisfy the world's craving," the piece reports continued steady expansion of the drug trade from Latin America.

The drug industry there has decentralized, the story reports, as large cartels have lost market share to smaller operators. A Colombian intelligence source is quoted comparing the decapitation of the Cali Cartel with taking a hammer to a blob of mercury:

New Jersey gave Browne 14,434 votes, for 0.49% of the total.


ASK THE CAMPAIGN PRO

This is a new feature in the NJLP bag of tricks; a political advice column that will, hopefully, answer some questions you might have about political operations. Politics, I stress; not government. Government advice is better left to those who care about such esoterica, and, to be perfectly frank, I don't.

I'm a political consultant, and as such, my job is politics. Which means that I have only one goal in my professional life. That goal is to get my clients elected to office and to try to do it in the least expensive and most efficient way possible. Sometimes when I win, I meet neither of the two goals I mentioned in the last sentence. But the important thing is that I win.

By way of background, in case you care, I'm 36 years old, married with three sons, a graduate of the University of Maryland, a veteran of US Army Intelligence and also a veteran of numerous campaigns; many as a kid and teenage volunteer growing up in South Florida and a plethora as a professional at the local, county, initiative and referendum, judicial, state legislative, and federal levels. My professional win percentage currently stands at just below 80%. With that said, here goes. And oh yeah, I'm a registered Libertarian.



- A: No. Those are terms that serve as excuses for losers. There are only winners and losers in politics. Second or third place doesn't count for squat.
- Q: What should a candidate be concerned about in a well-run campaign?
- A: Only two things: raising money and effectively communicating his message to the voters. Everything else is handled by staff. A thoroughbred horse cannot win the Kentucky Derby if it is worrying about what color its livery is.
- **O**: What should a campaign director be concerned about in a well-run campaign?
- A: Everything under the sun. Should all that be your responsibility? No, you must delegate much of it to competent subordinates while maintaining overall command. But keep the vast majority of it out of the candidate's hands (see previous question).
- Q: What kind of organizational structure best suits a modern campaign?
- A: A military one. Why? Because, like a military campaign, a political campaign is not an exercise in philosophical discourse or ideological purity, but a coordinated logistical, tactical, and strategic marketing effort to seize a specific objective (political office). Nothing less, nothing more. Government, on the other hand, is much more.

PROPOSED BYLAWS **AMENDMENTS**

NJLP member Ed Wiessmann will move the adoption of the following bylaws amendments at the March 15th NJLP Convention. Wiessmann says these ten deletions will abolish the NJLP State Board. In the January NJL, he had also proposed new procedures for replacing absent Steering Committee members, and attaching responsibilities to some Steering Committee seats. Wiessmann is withdrawing both of those proposals, and now seeks only to abolish the NJLP State Board.

All items cite section and subsection letters and numbers from the NJLP Bylaws:

Proposed changes

- Delete the words "State Board" or "or State Board" or "and State Board" from 3c, 3d, 5a1, 5a3 (twice), 5b1, 6a
- 5c3: Delete ", some of which may be joint meetings with the State Board"
- 5d: Delete entire sub-section
- 10c: Delete entire sub-section

In the March New Jersey Libertarian, Len Flynn and Ed Wiessmann debate the abolition of the NJLP State Board.
