Would you like to see a weekly cable TV show with a Libertarian viewpoint? Shad Woolley, Ben Grindlinger, Mark Ratz and Mike Herner said Yes to that question and are now enshrined in the NJLP's CATV Hall of Fame

Because of their efforts viewers in parts of Monmouth, Ocean, and Gloucester counties can enjoy Woolley's "A Third Point of View" on their local community access channel.

Woolley, Who has been producing and hosting the show for more than a year, has a large library of interesting programs. He reports that the public's reaction has been favorable. But the show needs a wider audience, which only you future Hall of Famers can provide as you reach for the stars and arrange for it to be aired on your local public access channel. The Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 states that "a requirement of reasonable third party access to cable sys-

tems will mean a wide diversity provided over cable." In other words, in return for a monopoly franchise, cable companies are expected to air views that might not otherwise be available to the community. For the exact terms of your local franchise contact city hall.

A Minority View

"The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people." That's the clear message of the now-meaningless 10th Amendment to our Constitution.

California has joined Colorado, Missouri, Hawaii and Illinois in asserting 10th Amendment rights, demanding that the federal government cease and desist all mandates and interferences exceeding those delegated by the Constitution. Under the leadership of state Sen. Don Rogers, a resolution claiming state sovereignty under the 10th Amendment won approval in the California Assembly by a vote of 54 to 12 and in the state Senate by 22 to 9. Similar resolutions, in protest against the heavy-handed mandates and edicts of Congress, are in the introductory or drafting stage in 12 other states.

Were it not for the 10th Amendment, our founders would have never ratified the Constitution. They correctly feared the development and consolidation of a powerful and meddling federal government. In "The Federalist Papers," James Madison explained Washington's role: "The powers delegated by the proposed Constitution to the federal government are few and defined. Those which are to remain in the state governments are numerous and indefinite. The former will be exercised principally on external objects, as war, peace, negotiation and foreign commerce The powers reserved to the several states will extend to all the objects which in the ordinary course of affairs concern the lives and liberties, and properties of the people, and the internal order, improvement and prosperity of the state."

The meaning of the 10th Amendment is clear. Our power-hungry Congress and derelict Supreme Court have allowed Madison's vision to be stood on its head. Today, the powers of the federal government are "numerous and indefinite," and those of the state are few."

The 10th Amendment movement may be America's last chance

to peacefully get Congress to obey the Constitution. Politicians have seriously underestimated public anger and are blind to the rebellion spreading across the land. In response to the heavy hand of the U.S. Forest Service, New Mexico's Catron County officials enacted the U.S. Constitution as a county ordinance and put federal officials on notice that, before they even dared to breathe in Catron County, they'd better show up at the supervisors meeting to get permission. Following Catron County's lead, five other New Mexico counties, every Utah county, and Clark county and Siskiyou County in Nevada have begun resisting congressional and bureaucratic tyranny.

Tens of thousands of Americans are discussing the formation of armed militia units. These are not kooks but law-abiding people who wish to be left alone by an increasingly illegitimate and meddling government. The gov-

ernment response is predictable. According to an Albuquerque Tribune (8/3/93) report, U.S. Forest Service Ranger Mike Gardner told Catron citizens, maybe with Waco on his mind, "What are you guys arming against a 30-30 (rifle)?-won't do any good against Bradley fighting vehicles and attack helicopters." Gardner should have been reminded that earlier patriots took on Great Britain, the mightiest nation at that time, and won.

Like our founders, we should first peacefully petition by getting 38 state legislatures to enact 10th Amendment resolutions and put teeth in them by giving a broad outline of mandates and edicts we refuse to meet. If Congress doesn't listen, we shouldn't hesitate to use the language tyrants understand best.

Polly Przbyl, 36, lived in a small New York Town called Lockport. She had been married to husband for 17 years and was raising two children, ages 10 and 11. But there were allegations that Lee beat her, the marriage deteriorated, and on August 12 of this year, Polly left her husband.

Heading for her mother's home, Polly and the kids stayed overnight in a motel. Lee stalked them across the county to the motel. When Polly and her kids started the second leg of their trip, Lee called ahead to his mother in law's home, telling Polly's sister Mindy that he was carrying one of Polly's handguns. Polly had a pistol permit and a federal firearms license. Lee had neither.

Polly and the kids arrived at her mother's Cheektowaga, New York home an August 14. Within minutes, the three women- Polly, her sister Mindy, and mother Gloria-heard noises at the front door. They saw Lee, face against the window. They saw the doorknob turn. They heard the children scream, but the door was locked. Gun in hand, Polly called 911. Mindy remembers her sister's words well: "Polly

yelled into the phone, I left my husband Friday and he's found out where I am, and he's trying to break into the house. I'm almost positive he's armed but I have a licensed pistol-send someone right away."

When police arrived on the scene, they disarmed Polly. The handgun was not surrendered. Polly did not turn it over to government authorities of her own free will. According to Mindy (and the police department's own report) Polly's gun was "confiscated" Polly told the authorities, I can't believe you want to take away my guns...I have the legal right to protect myself and my children..."

Official government policy, however, instructed the Officers to remove firearms from "the home of a domestic disturbance" because given the "potential for violence, it would be better."

Within two days Polly had a court order of protection but on Aug. 22 during child visitation, Lee lured Polly into the backyard and stabbed her to death. Lee threw his son through the air when the child came upon the scene and shot sister Gloria dead when she

NRA cont. from page 3 came out. He then fired two rounds into the head of his dead wife, disarmed and left unprotected by the government. Her only chance to defend herself stripped away by the heavy brain dead bureaucracy.

Government is not and cannot be an all-knowing, all-seeing protector by your side every moment. To pretend otherwise is dangerous. And to pretend otherwise while taking active steps to limit citizens' ability to protect ourselves is deadly.

It is unacceptable that in America, the words, "I can't believe you want to take away my guns....I have the legal right to protect myself and my children...." were spoken by a double murder victim.

Unacceptable!

Nineteenth century author Alexis de Tocqueville once wrote, "The greatness of America lies in her ability to repair her own faults." For Polly Przbyl's sake, for all our sakes, let's make sure that statement holds true.

On going business:

The premium that will be offered to \$50 contributors is a \$20 "AmeriVox" long distance phone card. RESOLVED, that the N.J.L.P. reimburse Grindlinger \$5 for each \$50 contributor who requests an AmeriVox card. PASSED with two abstentions Quarles & Grindlinger. **Cable TV show** Ellett has written an article for the newsletter urging readers to arrange for the airing on their local public access channel of the outreach show, "Third Point of View". He will contact Woolley and McNerney about improving the distribution of the video tapes to the participating

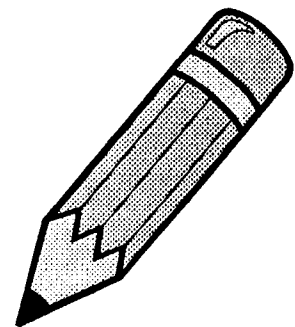

Press Advisory: Libertarian Party

21 Item Hit List

This is the Libertarian Parties hit list from the "Challenge to the Republicans." Each item is followed by a brief description, the cost to the taxpayer (where available) and the bill number of the most recent attempt to abolish or reduce funding for it.

"The Libertarian Party challenges the Republican Party to live up to its 'libertarian' promises, and immediately abolish or end funding for every one of these programs, agencies and policies," said National LP Chair Steve Dasbach.

Amtrak: Railroad subsidies, \$505 million. HR 4556, amendment by Hefley (R-CO) to cut Amtrak assistance by \$77 million, June 16, 1994. LP position; Eliminate it.

Corporation for Public Broadcasting: Subsidy "for collectivist value broadcasting at the taxpayers' expense." \$273 million. HR 4606, amendment by Crane (R-IL) to terminate funding, June 28, 1994. LP Position; Eliminate it.

Civilian Marksman Program: Subsidy of bullets to shooting groups and gun sportsman. \$2.5 million. HR 3116, amendment to end program, Sept. 30, 1993. LP position; Eliminate it.

Steamtown USA: For the operation of the Steamtown USA railroad museum in Scranton, PA. \$3.1 million. HR 2520, amendment to cut all funding, July 15, 1993. LP position; Eliminate it.

National Endowment for the Arts: Subsidy to museums, artists, and exhibits. \$171 million. HR 4602, amendment by Crane (R-IL) to eliminate all appropriations, June 22, 1994. LP position; Eliminate it.

Selective Service: Draft registration for 18 yr. old males. \$28 million. HR 4301, amendment by Dellems (D-CA.) to eliminate program, May 23, 1994. LP position; Eliminate it.

Economic Development Administration: Gives grants to local governments, public institutions, and non-profit organizations. "A creature of Congressional Pork Barrel barons who distribute money to their own districts", said Dasbach. \$350 million. HR 4603, amendment by Hefley (R-CO) to abolish the agency, May 12, 1994. LP position; Abolish it.

The Appalachian Regional Commission: Funds Appalachian Mountain projects. \$249 million. HR 2442, amendment by Goss (R-FL) to kill authorization of the agency, May 11, 1994. LP position; Abolish it.

Fossil Energy Research: Funds the Fossil Energy Research Advanced Computational Technology Initiative. \$428.5 million. HR 4602, amendment by Bradley (D-NJ) to cut \$10 million, July 26, 1994. LP position; Eliminate it.

The Davis Bacon Act: Requires federal contracts to use the "prevailing union wage rates" for federal construction projects. Estimated yearly cost to taxpayers; \$700 million. S 1513, amendment by Craig (R-ID) to limit Davis Bacon Act for school construction, Aug 2, 1994. LP position; Repeal it.

The Interstate Commerce Commission: Regulates trucking, airfreight and rail shipping rates. "The ICC

has historically served the interests of the established railroad and trucking firms by keeping prices high and competition down". \$45 million. HR 4556, amendment by Kasich (R-OH) to abolish the ICC, June 16, 1994. LP position; Abolish it.

The National Service Program: Education grants to young people in exchange for community service programs. "Typically, the bill spends more on administration of the program than in direct educational awards to participants." \$389 million. HR 2010, July 28, 1993. LP position; Abolish it.

FCC S 12 expands controls on 900 lines including censorship and cable TV rates and service. LP position; Repeal these First Amendment violations.

Grazing Fees: Below market price grazing for western farmers on government lands. R 2520, bill to raise fees to market levels, Oct 20, 1993. LP position; End subsidies, sell the land to private owners.

Space Station: "A \$16.5 BILLION gift to the space industry." \$2.2 billion in 1995. HR 4625, amendment by Roemer (D-IN) to end the project, June 29, 1994. LP position; End it.

DC Domestic Partners' regulation: Specifically prohibits the District of Columbia from offering domestic partners (i.e. unmarried gay or straight couples) group health insurance, even at higher premium rates. HR 4649, amendment by Barton (R-TX), July 13, 1994. LP position; Overturn ban, end government discrimination.

Shipping Quotas and Subsidies: Requires US Flag flying ships for the shipment of any taxpayer subsidized cargo. Inflates transportation costs by more than twice the world average in some cases. HR 2750 from Sen Brown (R-CO) to end the policy. Cost 1.2 Billion over ten yrs. LP position; Eliminate it.

Overseas Marketing Board: Gives money to large US Corp. to advertise agricultural products overseas. \$75 million. HR 2493, bill from Sen. Bryan (D-NV) to eliminate the program. LP position; Eliminate it.

Semiautomatic Weapons Ban: Bans the manufacture and sale of 19 specific weapons. HR 4296, May 5, 1994. LP position; Repeal it.

"War on Drugs" civil liberties violations; 1) Treats non-violent drug dealers like violent criminals in mandatory minimum sentencing. HR 3355, July 20, 1994. 2) Amendment codifying the "good faith" exemption to the exclusionary rule. "This is used almost completely in Drug War enforcement, and represents an erosion of Fourth Amendment rights." HR 3371, March 17, 1992. LP position: Repeal these Bill of Rights violations.

NATO and UN military expenses: 1) Would make European NATO countries and Japan increase their share of defense costs. HR 4301, amendment by Bryan (D-TX), May 18, 1994. LP position; Yes, make other countries pay for their own defense. 2) \$1.2 billion fund for UN "peace keeping" operations. HR 3759, amendment by Frank (D-MA), Feb. 3, 1994. LP position: Yes, eliminate unnecessary UN funding.
