# NJLP's Buoncristiano Implores Maryland Libertarians, and All of Us, to "Be Bold Again!"

Mike Buoncristiano, the NJLP's Political Director and President of AVANTI! Marketing Solutions, Inc., gave the keynote Speech to open the Maryland Libertarian Party Convention last week. Mike's comments - It's Time to Be Bold Again - were enthusiastically received by our neighbors to the south.

Knowing the Marylanders were facing a big challenge to collect 10,000 signatures for ballot access. Mike encouraged them by reminding them that this was indeed also a great opportunity since, in the past, they needed almost three times that number.

Mike noted that his earlier dismay after reading "A Nation

of Sheep" has now turned into real concern and suggested that someone should write the sequel and call it "A Nation of Ostriches" since it aptly describes America's current plight – "over 250 million people, heads buried in the sand, secure and comfortable while their eggs are being stolen from their nest and their very feathers plucked from their exposed buttocks to fashion regal plumes for those who prey upon them under the guise of Big Government Benevolence - truly an oxymoron if there ever was one."

In addition, he said, they had all they needed to accomplish their goal – a message that rings true, an authentic and noble cause, and an audience that is more dissatisfied than ever with the the results they have been promised but have not received. He said the time is right because more people than ever are questioning the personal cost of a collective society both in terms of money and infringement.

Delegates cheered when he encouraged them to remind their fellow Americans that they have had a "New Frontier, Trickle Down Economics, the New Deal, and The Fair Deal but for the past 60 years what we've really had is the Raw Deal. Let us teach others that Big Government has failed us."

Mike urged his fellow libertarians to remember that "Libertarianism is not just about Freedom and revolutionary times but about people. Everyday people who simply want to run their own lives the way they think is best. Ordinary people, who will take responsibility for their own acts. Caring people, who respect other people and their rights." He counseled: "Let us today remember all of these people. Let us tomorrow, when we leave here, set out to inspire these people."

"All you need is the determination, persistence, passion and boldness that have turned countless dreams into reality—and framing these tools with a message that John and Jane Voter can quickly understand and relate to their everyday lives in terms

## LIBERTARIANISM IN THREE MINUTES

I'm Austin Lett, a Libertarian running for the House of Representatives. By Libertarian, I mean a person who values personal freedom and bridles at being taxed and regulated by government politicians and bureaucrats. By Libertarian, I mean a person who believes that government should protect people and property and then leave us alone.

If you think that there are too many cops, enforcing too many laws, providing too many favors for those who have PBA cards or car decals, then you may be a Libertarian.

If you think that people with personal freedom will create abundance, wealth and happiness for themselves and others in ways politicians and planners could never dream of, then you may be a Libertarian.

I think all politicians should learn to be humble. One way to teach them humility might be to require them to wear a propeller hat like this one whenever they appear in public. It might teach them humility and would give us warning so we can avoid them.

I have been married for twenty seven years to Lyla Lett. Lyla will be on your ballot this November too, as a Libertarian candidate for Freeholder. We call them "Freeloaders." She has pledged to do away with county government in New Jersey. She joins me in wishing you the freeest happiest life you can live for yourself. Her guiding principle and mine is "Live and Let Live."

# **CAMPAIGN FORUM**

In the coming months, NJLP's Political Coordinator Mike Buoncristiano will author/edit a column on campaign goals, strategies and tactics. To get the ball rolling on some of the perennial issues surrounding Libertarian campaigns, we reprint the following articles by Ron Crickenberger, Political Director of the Libertarian Party of the USA. - Ed.

# Candidate Recruitment Article #1 - by Ron Crickenberger from the Introduction to the Libertarian Party Candidate Recruitment Manual (1998)

The purpose of the Libertarian Party is to move public policy in a Libertarian direction by fielding and electing Libertarian Party candidates. It follows that the more candidates we have and the better those candidates are, the further we will move policy along the path toward freedom.

A debate has long raged in the LP as to which is the best strategy. Should we:

- \* Run as many candidates as possible, or
- \* Concentrate our resources on one or two candidates.

The answer to both parts of the question is yes. The media and the public pay attention when we run a full slate of candidates. And, we need full slates in order to be sure of having a few races which deserve concentrated resources. It is no accident that tiny New Hampshire, which runs as many candidates as any of the large states, has more elected Libertarians than any other state.

Another strategy question is:

- \* Should we run national level and statewide candidates for outreach, or
- \* Run local candidates where we have a chance to win?

Again, we should take yes for an answer. National level and statewide campaigns do provide the most bang for the buck in terms of free media, outreach, and short-term membership growth for the Party. But winning local elections is crucial to our long-term success. We must build a support base for our candidates by winning locally to set the stage for larger victories later. By having a strategy which encourages lots of candidates at all levels, our candidates will be able to run in the races which are important to them, setting the stage for them to do the best job possible.

# Candidate Recruitment Article #2 - by Ron Crickenberger from the Director's column in LP News (February 1998) - updated & edited

Will you help make 1999 and 2000 record-breaking years for Libertarian candidates?

The past two years were record-breaking years for Libertarian Party candidates. In 1997, we ran more candidates, who raised more money, and achieved more victories than ever before in an odd-year election.

Our record 36 victories in '97 came from candidates who ran for entry-level political offices. These local officials will be the "farm team" for the LP - gaining experience in office and developing a support base to lead them to victories in higher office later.

In 1998, we are running more confirmed candidates than ever before. In several states, we are actually fielding more candidates for U.S. Congress than either of the old parties. The same is true for county-level offices in other states.

With more candidates comes more exposure for Libertarian ideas, more money to spread the message, and most importantly, more Libertarians in office.

Will you be a part of Libertarian victory in 1999 and 2000? Will you be one of our Libertarian candidates?

What should you run for? That depends on what you are best suited for, and what you are most interested in. The LP has long debated whether it is best to run top-of-ticket, high-visibility campaigns, or to run lower-level campaigns where the chance to win is greater.

These are not mutually exclusive strategies. Campaigns at all levels have the ability to grow the party and move public policy in a Libertarian direction. Plus, our past history shows that the more candidates a state runs, the higher the average vote totals for all our candidates. There is a synergy that occurs when we run many candidates for all levels of office.

And keep in mind the real reason for you to run as a Libertarian candidate. Breaking numerical records is nice, but it's not the real goal. It's only a means to an end.

The real reason is to help bring about a freer life for ourselves and our children. As one of our Libertarian candidates, you will be a part of the political force that helps restore our heritage of individual liberty.
