EYEWITNESS CONVENTION REPORT

My flight arrived in Seattle several hours late. By the time I found a place to sleep, it was 3 AM Friday (that's 6 AM Eastern time). I staggered onto the convention floor later that day, where the Platform Committee's report was being debated.

The delegates had completed their review of the first three pages of the committee's report, which dealt with issues like AIDS, putting the U.S. flag on Kuwaiti ships, military policy, the Securities and Exchange Commission, and freedom of communication. The remaining 7 pages never made the floor of the convention, being preempted by debate on the "Libertarian Party Program."

This was a surprise to many of the delegates, including me, who had no idea that such a project was afoot. The Program can be described as a useful and necessary outreach tool, or as a confusing, watered-down version of the Platform. It consists of a preamble and then ten points addressing ten areas of interest to

Libertarians. An attempt to pass the whole thing without debate failed. The preamble was approved after debate and minor changes.

Since time was passing, the convention delegates skipped to Point 4: "Taxes: The Cruellest Burden." The point failed to pass as it got bogged down in debate. The convention voted to consider the Program again the next morning. On Saturday morning another attempt to pass the whole Program was made, but it failed by about 4 votes to get the 2/3 vote required.

I distributed the NJLP's brand new outreach materials: "Government: the Big Lie" and the "Man-in-the-Mirror" brochure. Both pieces received a lot of praise, and I liberally granted permission to reprint them to anyone who asked.

A candidate's forum was held on Friday evening. Russell Means, Ron Paul, Harry Glenn, Andre Marrou and Jim Lewis answered questions--very entertaining! The following day all five candidates were nominated to run for President. Andre Marrou gracefully declined and received a lot of applause.

Thereafter, among the balloons with feathers printed on them and the "Ron" signs, the delegates voted. Ron Paul won the nomination on the first ballot by one vote.

Andre Marrou was the only announced candidate for Vice President. However, Russell Means and Paul Murphy (who played a major role in the LP Program) were quickly nominated. Means declined in a brief speech to the delegation. He then received a standing ovation lasting about fifteen minutes. (In fact, throughout the convention Means generated more applause than anyone

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else, which Ron Paul mentioned humorously during his banquet speech later that evening.) Murphy quickly declined his nomination, the rules were suspended, and Andre Marrou was nominated by unanimous voice vote.

Prior to the Convention, the National LP Regions were dissolved. New Jersey had been in a region with Pennsylvania and Delaware. At the time I left the plan was for New Jersey and Pennsylvania to form a new region, but I couldn't stay to see it happen. There is so much more, wish you were there!

NJLP STEERING COMMITTEE MEETING

The NJLP Steering Committee met on August 19, 1987 at Skinny Vinnie's Pizza in New Brunswick. (Patti's was closed for renovations.) Present were Flynn, Maiullo, Friedlander, and Peters. Duprey, Zeldin, and Harris were absent. Flynn, serving as acting Chairman, called the meeting to order (from chaos) at 8:00 PM.

The minutes were read and approved by general consent. Then the group heard the Treasurer's report, which noted that 44 renewals had been sent out the week before. (Please renew, members!)

The status of Mike Pierone was raised and Treasurer Maiullo noted he was not and had never been a member of the NJLP. A motion to remove Mike as the NJLP representative for Sussex County, if he does not join before the next (9-16-87) NJLP meeting, passed unanimously.

The Steering Committee next passed a motion to implement the decisions made by the NJLP Convention last March concerning our delegation at the National Convention. The committee voted to empower the acting NJLP delegation chairman Dan Karlan to substitute NJLP members for missing delegates at the National LP Convention in Seattle. The committee approved procedures to assist Dan in his task. The NJLP Secretary was directed to send a letter to Dan and to the National LP instructing both as to these procedures.

Dan Maiullo volunteered to prepare 4 line labels of the "free list" for the New Jersey Libertarian then the latest version of the list was circulated for the members enlightenment and comment. The "free list" consists of those organizations and publications with whom we exchange newsletters. The meeting adjourned at 8:40 PM.

The State Committee will meet at 6:30 PM at Patti's on September 16. One major agenda item will be to hear a report about the National Convention from the NJLP delegates who attended. A Steering Committee meeting will be held on October 21 at 6:30 PM at Farrell's Ice Cream Parlour, Route 18 South, in the Brunswick Square Mall. The October meeting will celebrate Steve Friedlander's birthday!

Never were the people of the colonies required (except by England) to fulfill certain obligations for the dubious benefit of citizenship. Americans fought, not for their country or government, but for themselves. They were not loyal patriots but traitors to King George III. If their criminal action had not succeeded, they would have been hanged. Happily, they did succeed, and inspired anti-government uprisings and revolutions in Europe and throughout the Western Hemisphere.

The philosophy of self-sacrifice can be found throughout the writings and speeches of Lenin, Hitler, Musso-

Individual rights are sacrosanct

Milton Shaw (July 5) perverts the meaning of our Constitution and the American spirit in claiming that the individual exists for society. Countries such as Nazi Germany, Soviet Russia and the ayatollah's Iran are among the most consistent examples of systems predicated on sacrifice of the individual to the collective. It is disgraceful that Shaw can argue that such sacrifice is the obligation of all Americans. It is obscene that the Asbury Park Press offers such a commentary, not as an alternative viewpoint, but as a celebration of the American spirit on the Fourth of July weekend.

The United States was the first nation founded on the premise that each individual is an end in his or her self. The Declaration of Independence stated that individual rights are *inalienable*, not temporary permissions that can be withdrawn anytime someone declares that the "public good" demands it. The Constitution, and especially the Bill of Rights, restricted the realm of government force so that individual rights could not be violated. In this way America is unique. And it is because of our respect for the individual that we have achieved all that we have.

In this 200th anniversary year of our Constitution, it is worthwhile for all Americans to consider the meaning of that great document and the ideas on which this nation was founded. Freedom is incompatible with the sacrifice of the individual to the collective. If America is to remain free, individual rights must be understood and preserved.

Libertarian explains why he left Republican Party

(Ron Paul, who is seeking the Libertarian Party presidential nomination, is a Texas physician who was a Republican member of the U.S. House of Representatives from 1976 through 1984. This is an adaptation of a Jan. 8 letter he wrote to resign from the Republican Party.)

My whole life, I believed in the Republican Party and its free-enterprise philosophy. At age 21 I cast my first vote, for Ike and the entire Republican slate.

Later I became a political activist. Eventually I was elected to Congress four times. In 1976 I was impressed with Ronald Reagan's program and was one of four congressmen who endorsed his candidacy. In 1980 I again supported our president in his efforts. This year — 1987 — I resigned in disgust from the Republican Party.

Efforts to reduce government

Since 1981 I have steadily grown weary of the Republican Party's supposed efforts to reduce the size of the federal government.

Ronald Reagan and the Republican Party have given us skyrocketing deficits and a doubled national debt. How is it that the party of balanced budgets, with control of the White House and the Senate, accumulated red ink greater than all previous administrations put together? Tip O'Neill cannot alone be blamed.

Tax revenues are up 59 percent since 1980. Because of economic growth? No. During Carter's four years, we had growth of 37.2 percent; Reagan's five years have given us 30.7 percent. The new revenues are due to four gigantic Republican tax increases since 1981.

Republicans rightly chastised Carter for his \$38 billion deficit. But they ignore or even defend deficits of \$220 billion, as government spending has grown 10.4 percent per year since Reagan took office, while the federal payroll has zoomed by a quarter of a million bureaucrats.

The debt poses a grave danger to our country. We have lost the chance to reduce spending and the deficit in a non-crisis fashion. Worse, big government has been legitimized in a way the Democrats never could have accomplished.

Amidst the failure of the Gramm-Rudman gimmick, we hear the president and the Republican Party call for a balanced-budget amendment, and a line-item veto. This is a smoke-screen. Reagan, as governor of California, had a line-item veto and virtually never used it. As president, he has failed to consistently exercise his constitutional responsibility to veto spending.

Far from being cut, the immeasurable waste

in the Department of Defense has gotten worse, with the result that we are less secure today. Reagan's foreign aid expenditures exceed Eisenhower's, Kennedy's, Johnson's, Nixon's, Ford's and Carter's put together. Foreign intervention has exploded since 1980. Only an end to military welfare for foreign governments plus a curtailment of our unconstitutional commitments abroad will enable us really to defend ourselves and solve our financial problems.

Monetary policy has been disastrous. The five Reagan appointees to the Federal Reserve Board have advocated even faster monetary inflation than Paul Volcker, and this is the fourth straight year of double-digit increases in the money supply. The chickens have yet to come home to roost, but they will.

Candidate Reagan in 1980 correctly opposed draft registration. Yet when he had the chance to abolish it, he reneged, as he did on his pledge to abolish the Departments of Energy and Education. Under the guise of attacking drug use and money laundering, the administration has attacked personal and financial privacy. (Should people really be put on a suspected drug-dealer list because they transfer \$3,000 at one time?) Reagan's urine testing of Americans without probable cause is a violation of our civil liberties, as are his proposals for extensive "lie detector" tests.

Under Reagan, the IRS has grown bigger, richer, more powerful and more arrogant. Reagan's new tax "reform" gives even more power to the IRS. Far from making taxes fairer or simpler, it deceitfully raises more revenue for government waste. Knowing this administration's record, I wasn't surprised by its Libyan disinformation campaign, Iranian arms-for-hostages swap or illegal funding of the Contras.

Democratic agenda dangerous

Republicans know that the Democratic agenda is dangerous to our political and economic health. Yet, in the past six years Republicans have expanded its worst aspects and called them their own.

The Republican Party has not reduced the size of government. It has become big government's best friend. I conclude that one must look to other avenues if a successful effort is ever to be achieved in reversing America's direction.

USA: THE SOLUTION

In his book Fight, Flight, Fraud: The Story of Taxation, Charles Adams points out that throughout history great civilizations have been destroyed not by external aggression but by two insidious, internal forces: excessive taxation and currency debasement.

Americans now pay about 42% of their income to all four levels of government (federal, state, county, local). Only a portion of this is actually income tax--the rest is sales, real estate tax, personal property tax, estate tax, inheritance, import tax, luxury tax, oil duty tax, gasoline tax, ad infinitum.

Contrast this with the 25% that feudal serfs paid their manor lords during the Dark Ages hundreds of years ago. Compared to serfs, present-day Americans certainly live better, but they get to keep only 58% of their income, whereas the serfs kept 75%.

It wasn't always like this in "the land of the free and the home of the brave". From 1776 to 1913--or for 137 years--there was no income tax at all. Only during the last 74 years have we been blessed with it. The income tax was debated for three years in Congress before it passed--in fact, it had already been declared unconstitutional in 1897. When it became the law of the land, it was supposed to remain at 1% of income. But William Jennings Bryan, member of the U.S. House of Representatives, warned that "if we pass this bill, someday the income tax may rise as high as 10%". We should be so lucky as to have only a 10% income tax nowadays.

Debasement of the currency? American dollars lost the backing of, and instant convertibility into, gold in 1933. To add insult to injury our greenbacks lost the backing and convertibility of silver in 1967 and copper in 1983. Inflation has become endemic--people don't discuss whether we're going to have inflation, but how much. Prices have soared. American business is steadily losing competitiveness.

Paper currency? President Thomas Jefferson said in 1824, when the printing of paper money was being discussed in Congress, that if Americans printed money--instead of minting it--then "someday

the price of bacon will rise to .04 per pound". How would you like to buy bacon at that price?

What can and should--perhaps must--we do? The answers are, surprisingly, simple and well known. All it takes is the guts to put them into effect. They include:

1. Reduce the size of government, at all levels, to a small fraction--say 10%--of what it is now.

2. Abolish the income tax and the IRS. Replace it with user fees (such as fuel tax going directly into road maintenance), voluntary contributions (people bequeath property to the government every day), and those few taxes stipulated in the original Constitution.

3. Adopt the Liberty Amendment, already endorsed by 9 states. It was proposed in 1962, several years before the Libertarian Party was founded. This Amendment would get the USA government out of competition (e.g. the TVA manufactures and markets fertilizer) and would abolish the income tax and estate tax.

4. Withdraw our troops from protecting foreign soil; so that they can defend the USA itself. If an aggressor force invaded our country today, it would find only skeleton forces defending us; since most of our troops are overseas defending Japan, Germany, Korea, Britain, and on and on. This in turn allows these nations to spend less on defending themselves, leaving more to spend on industrial competition with us.

5. Get rid of all subsidies to business. For example, the Department of Agriculture spends millions of dollars subsidizing tobacco farmers, while the Surgeon General spends millions of dollars dissuading Americans from smoking, chewing, and dipping tobacco. Is this insane, or what? Tobacco is well known to be a harmful, addictive drug which directly causes cancer. And our government, using our tax money, is subsidizing addiction to this drug.

6. Get the government out of the personal lives of Americans. We should be able to do what we want with our own bodies, so long as we don't forcibly interfere with others or cost them money. Abolish the Drug Enforcement Administration, along with free hospital care for drug abusers. Get rid of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and their hideous, racist quotas--so that persons who can support themselves without

government help can become Americans. Send the Bureau of Indian Affairs--surely the most racist, discriminatory, condescending, paternalistic, arrogant bureaucracy in the last 100 years--into the wild blue yonder.

7. Put the police to solving crimes of violence and fraud, such as murder, rape, and robbery. Take them out of interfering with Americans' private, voluntary, non-coercive affairs--such as gambling, prostitution, and recreational substances. Make the police protect us from muggers and rapists, instead of making excuses why they can't because they're chasing speeders or busting hookers.

8. Get the government out of religion, out of education, out of communication, out of transportation, out of income redistribution. In his book Losing Ground, Charles Murray shows that mandated minimum wages hurt only young, uneducated, minority persons; that welfare (wages without work) begets more welfare and kills any incentive to get off it; that governmentally controlled and subsidized education is bad and getting worse. As President Andrew Jackson said, "Equal rights for all; special privileges for none."

The USA, the American way of life, does have a beautiful future, if--and only if--we exhibit the courage to change what's eating out our substance and causing immense strife in our society. If we do not, if we continue down the path of more governmental power and correspondingly less individual liberty; then "America the Beautiful" will become the late, great USA just as surely as the invincible Roman Empire joined the dust heap of history.

It is up to us. We can do it, if only we will.

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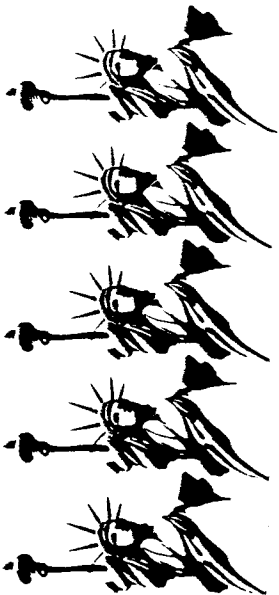
