NJLP STEERING COMMITTEE MEETING

The NJLP State Committee met on February 6, 1990 at Dan Karlan's parents home in Cranbury. At 3:15 PM Dan called the meeting to order. Also present were Stefanelli, Stewart, Edelston, Kaplan, Schoen, and Flynn (late). Zeldin was absent.

The group first heard the Treasurer's report from Lou Stefanelli. The recent renewal

mailing is proceeding with another one planned to National LP members seeking their membership in the NJLP.

Lou mentioned that the annual cost per member for the New Jersey Libertarian was about \$15. Two options to cover the increased cost were discussed: raising dues and get more high-category members.

Finally, the proposed NJLP 1990 Budget was approved for submission to the NJLP annual convention with a motion to include a projected expenditure of \$200 for legal fees passing 4-1 with one abstention.

Two expenditures were approved by the committee. Carl Peters bill for \$31.45 for distribution of the first Legislative Watch newsletter passed and \$46.88 to John Langdon for 1000 convention flyers was also approved.

Development Coordinator Sam Edelston reported 13 new members in response to the recent mailing. Michelle Maloney is the state Operation Political Homeless Chair now and volunteers willing to help should call her at 201/572-1614.

Ken Kaplan reported that the NJLP has been invited to participate in the March 11, 1990 West Orange St. Patrick's Day parade. The NJLP contingent must assemble at 11:30 A.M. at the staging area behind the municipal building at Main and Mt. Pleasant Avenues. Ken is the one to contact for the NJLP marchers (201/992-3991).

Laura Stewart mentioned that the NJLP was also invited to the 5/5/90 drug legalization parade in Manhattan. Don Meinshausen is

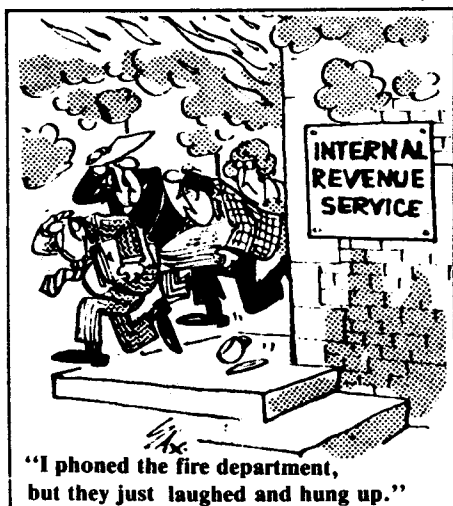

RE: HOTEL TAX REFUND

Dear fellow libertarian:

I am writing to you because you attended the 1989 Libertarian Party convention in Philadelphia August 30 - September 3, and you probably stayed at the Wyndham Franklin Plaza Hotel. (I was co-coordinator of the convention.)

If you stayed at the Wyndham Franklin Plaza, you paid a 5% City hotel tax. Two years ago, I and others filed a class-action suit challenging that portion of the hotel tax which is being used to partially fund the development of a new convention center in Philadelphia. In a nutshell, we oppose this center (the most expensive convention center ever conceived in the U.S.) because it is a welfare program for politically-connected big businesses in the City and a gravy train for special interest groups -- all at the expense of the long-suffering taxpayers.

In short, our suit claims that the tax is a special tax which provides no benefit to the group taxed, and that this special tax interferes with interstate commerce. Our suit is now before the Pennsylvania Supreme Court and will move to Federal Court if necessary.

Since you will not be benefited by a government-operated convention center which will open in 1995, **YOU DESERVE A TAX REFUND!** In order to press the issue, my attorneys have offered to act on your behalf. **THIS IS A FREE OFFER*.**

If everyone who gets this letter replies, we'll have hundreds of petitions to file with the Philadelphia tax authorities! There is no guarantee of the success of this endeavor; we're doing it for the principle (and for the fun of it!).

coordinating the NJLP effort (201/359-5222, bus. phone).

Ken Kaplan announced his intention to run for N.J. Governor in 1993 and will seek to build on Dan Karlan's effort last year. Howard Schoen volunteered to inventory the many NJLP audio tapes and make the list available to interested members.

To assist the new Legislative Watch Committee Ken will ask Carl Peters about the utility to Carl of word processing capabilities for his use. If Carl is favorable, Len Flynn will prepare a proposal to the NJLP annual convention requesting contributions particularly for this purpose. The committee praised Carl's efforts in Trenton but noted a need to improve the typing quality of the LWC's written materials.

Lou Stefanelli requested a new member welcome packet for him to send. Sam Edelston will work with Lou to develop one and additionally will create an inquiry packet for prospective members.

The committee discussed the problem of inactive County Representatives then unanimously approved this motion: the Steering Committee directs the NJLP Chair to contact County Chairs of inactive counties (without known activity) and notify them that county caucuses will be held at the NJLP Convention for the purpose of fostering active LP organizations in all counties.

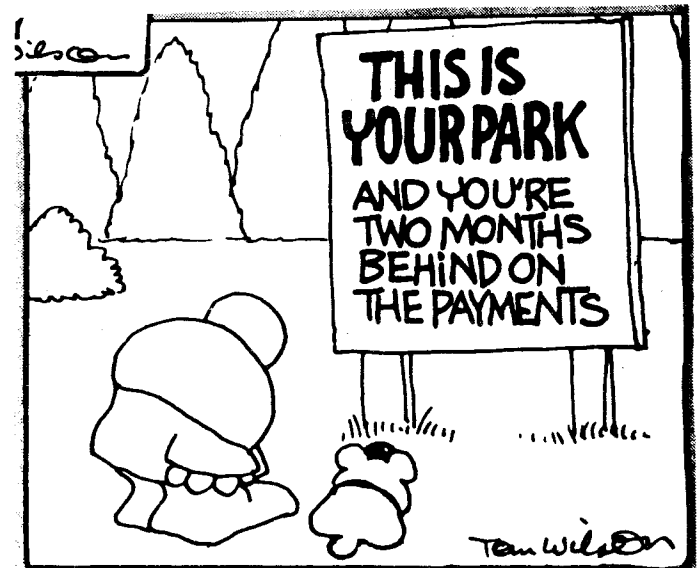
The Steering Committee unanimously approved a motion to raise the price for subscriptions to the New Jersey Libertarian to \$15. per year to cover their cost. A letter from National LP stating the post office ruling on postal rates for political parties will be taken to the Tennent Post Office by Len Flynn. This should restore the political rate for bulk mailings.

Two convention proposals will come before the membership: Laura Stewart's proposed quorum change to

Sec. 11 of the Bylaws and Sam Edelston's request to add a new "Patron" dues category for \$100 per year. Sam Edelston, Len Flynn, and Dan Karlan volunteered to phone people and recruit candidates for 1990. One inducement for prospective NJLP candidates is personal development-- increased public speaking and debating skills for the NJLP contender.

The meeting adjourned at 6:45 P.M. The next NJLP State Committee meeting is scheduled for Saturday, March 10, 1990 at lunch following the morning General Meeting and county caucuses at the NJLP state convention in New Brunswick.

Sex, Truth and Videotape

Sorry, but you'll have to settle for two out of three. There are tens of millions of people out there who do not, will not, and in millions of cases CANNOT read. Their only source of information is...television. Television! The Vast Wasteland, the Electronic Umbilical cord, the Glass Teat (as Harlan Ellison called his column). Yes, it IS frightening. But instead of merely tsk, tsking, about it, we CAN make use of that fact. What ARE we doing with it? Very little.

Yes, we have occasionally used TV ads. They cost money, lots of it, for production and air time. Public Access TV studios and air time are available, in many areas, at minimal cost, and often not being used - by anybody.

What do we as Libertarians want to do? Educate and convert people into enthusiastic advocates of freedom, right? Realistically, I'll settle for educating them. For every Howard Beale (Network, "I'm mad as hell and I'm not going to take this anymore.") we awaken, there are many more who react "Oh..." to an idea new to them, then slip back to being walking vegetables, H. L. Mencken's "booboisie". They don't vote, and our only threat from them is in lynch mobs. We want to reach the people Jefferson was confident of, and not just those whose pet ox is being gored by Big Brother. 2500 years ago, Solon said "True justice will exist only when those not affected by a law are as indignant as those who are."

Long ago, before there was a Libertarian Party, when I first learned about The Right and The Left, I wondered why anyone could object to having the freedoms of BOTH, as long as one accepted the responsibilities. Naturally, I supported the Second Amendment. Recently I realized it should have been the First, and been called the Right to Defend Yourself and Others, which sounds less aggressive. Besides, the acronym - ardeeyo - is more pronounceable than RKBA. At the same time, I learned what our Founding Fathers to a man (sorry!) said about it and the Militia. POW! In one page of quotes, the Liberals' argument is destroyed. Totally. Completely.

Feeling like a newly converted True Believer who is compelled to spread The Word, I wondered how to get The Word out. Television, of course! The obvious audio and video and a few inspirations and some revisions yielded Page 4.

In ONE MINUTE, we can present an irrefutable argument. All the quotes are probably too much to fit into a minute so we could make different versions and get extra mileage from one idea. Using the portion from Jefferson's quote to the end, it can even be done in thirty seconds. That's the absolute minimum, tho. (There are limits to what even I can do.) AND...it should qualify as a Public Service Announcement.

No, I don't expect Liberal stations to run it as a PSA. They may even refuse our money if we want to BUY air time. Remember what happened to the Grace Commission ad? But...there ARE Conservative stations out there, and it would be adaptable to radio. North America One Satellite Radio broadcasts twenty-four hours a day, every day. The schedule is in The Spotlight newspaper, published by Liberty Lobby. And then there's Right-Winger Gordon McLendon's chain of radio stations. Tho it might be considered "preaching to the choir", how many of the choir know those quotes?

So how do we make a video? With a camera (even a camcorder), subjects or images, editing equipment, and a character generator. In this case, "character" means letters and numbers, etc. as in titles. It has nothing to do with integrity, ethics, etc.

At the National, I passed out about seventy copies of an earlier version of RDYO. Responses ranged from mild enthusiasm to "Fabulous!" From discussions, I developed other ideas. They are all easily and inexpensively produced and, I like to think, memorable and irrefutable. The Post Office "Imagine...if the government had a monopoly on pizza"; Jury's Veto (NOT Jury Veto; Judges ARE vetoing juries - rejecting or prohibiting them from acting. NOT Jury Nullification; that's what is happening TO juries: they ARE BEING nullified); Choices in Education "Doesn't it frighten you that your children are learning all about government in schools that are owned and operated BY the government?"; and another RDYO featuring Milton Friedman "First they came for the money..." and Clint Eastwood "Now they're coming to take our guns..." We can do one or more ads or PSAs for each of our beliefs.

What NOT to do

A couple of years ago a patriot organization on Long Island produced and presented a series of programs over cable TV. I was enthusiastic, tho I couldn't afford to contribute \$. I still have not seen them so I can't comment, but I expect they were reasonable interesting. However, they produced NO response from whatever audience did watch. What went wrong? For one thing, the title. "The Public Informer" Quick now! What's YOUR reaction to the word "informer", positive or negative? Uh-huh.

An hour is a long time to try to hold the attention of an audience. That is PRIMARY - to keep them from changing the station. It's necessary to entertain them, not necessarily with "a laff a minute" but by being "interesting" with new ideas and solutions to their problems.

Sometimes the solution is opposite to what they have believed all their lives. It can be traumatic to have those beliefs shattered, but getting people to admit they were wrong doesn't have to be difficult. We can make it easy. "It's not your fault. The Government lied to you." If often requires repetition to overcome a lifetime of brain-pollution (not "brainwashing"; it's not) unless it is sufficiently overwhelming and the person is openminded. When I'm wrong, I try to cut my losses. "I was wrong, and I'm big enough to admit it."

I have found it effective to approach potentially hostile people at a tangent and not head-on. Years ago I was involved with the Radical Right because of my interest in Survival. How Radical? I inadvertently attended a Cross-Lighting (not "Cross-Burning"). Impressive! How Radical? It's a strange feeling to see a picture in a Post Office of someone you've spoken with and, to some extent, agreed.

Yeah, Radical! But they did NOT blow me away, ala Easy Rider, because I was very careful about pushing the wrong buttons, gently, if at all, and only after establishing credibility. "Ya know, one reason we gotta keep our guns is so we can defend our right...to use alcohol...and tobacco...and pot...and other DRUGS...responsibly." As Harry Tuttle said in Brazil, "We're all in this together, kid"

DRUGS! That never fails to attract attention. It's an emotional issue. Don't forget that. It's easier to defend someone or something

which is innocent (or it should be). I can always find a reason to bring up one of my favorite subjects - tangentially.

Picture a plant which until fifty years ago made the best paper which lasted virtually forever. The first drafts of the Declaration of Independence were written on it. Our first flags and the sails of our ships were made of it. The War of 1812 was fought over it. It made the strongest natural rope. The seeds have high nutritional value and the oil from them was used as a lubricant and in paint. The plant could be used as fuel. It could restore land, unlike cotton which depletes the soil. Unlike plastics, it is a renewable resource and does not pollute. And the extract from the flowers was a very popular medicine which never killed anyone. Used recreationally and admittedly hedonistically, it never killed anyone. What a contrast to the most radioactive plant on earth, tobacco, which kills hundreds of thousands of people every year!

The conspiracy which resulted in the outlawing of what is probably the most useful plant on our planet, a plant which could save us from the greenhouse effect, is an outrage and should enrage everyone concerned about our society's many problems. It is all fully documented in a book "The Emperor Wears No Clothes" by Jack Herer, which will soon be reprinted. The name of this wonderful plant? Hemp. Jack also managed to locate and copy (with a five minute introduction) "Hemp for Victory" the fourteen minute 1942 film made by the Dept of Agriculture and the Dept of War. They denied making it! It would be easy to add ten or forty minutes of intro and closing, run it on Public Access, and prepare for the response.

Hemp. What's in a name? Well, it's other name is...marijuana. Pot! Yeah, that's right. Same plant. But the term hemp doesn't cause Reefer Madness in those who have never smoked it, the way the words marijuana and pot do. I see hemp as the opening wedge to topple Big Brother. If they could have lied to us so totally on this one subject, isn't there the chance they've lied to us in some other areas? Maybe ALL other areas? Hmmm?

The most difficult part of producing a two hour video (or movie!) called "The Return of the Reefer Madness" would be deciding what to leave out. That would necessitate one or more sequels. Anyone interested? It might even make a profit. The classic example of Return On Investment is "Night of the Living Dead" which cost \$50 000 and grossed six million, as of several years ago. Any more people interested now?

LIBERAL TURFED

Anglophone turnaround gives Equality Jacques Cartier seat

At a ballroom packed with wild Equality Party supporters and four victorious candidates, Neil Cameron stood quietly in a corner receiving hearty and tearful congratulations.

He said he was still in shock from his stunning victory last night over Liberal incumbent Joan Dougherty in the West Island riding of Jacques Cartier.

"The four Equality members in the National Assembly will mix quite usefully and complement one another," Cameron said.

He said it didn't matter how many Equality members there were in the assembly: "It's not a question of what one plus one plus one plus one says, but how intelligently each one says it."

(Equality Party leader Robert Libman, broadcaster Gordon Atkinson and lawyer Richard Holden were also elected last night).

Earlier, at his campaign headquarters at the rear of a Pointe Claire gas station, Cameron said his victory was a triumph of individual rights, not the result of anti-French sentiment.

Cameron, 50, who teaches at John Abbott College, said he was feeling "just great, ecstatic, everything you can imagine."

Cameron won with 15,047 to Dougherty's 14,425. Parti Québécois candidate Claudette Monpetit polled 3,060.

For Dougherty, who was first elected in 1981 and had won the riding in 1985 with 80 per cent of the popular vote, the result was a stunning setback.

At Liberal headquarters, as she

watched a slim lead evaporate, Dougherty, clinging to the hope that the trend could be reversed as polls from another section of her riding were counted, kept repeating "Dorval" over and over until it became clear she'd lost the polls in that area as well.

As a television commentator announced that 98.5 per cent of the polls were in, a small army of supporters surrounded Dougherty, trying to persuade her she'd lost.

But she refused to believe it. She said the commentators were "extrapolating" and that she wouldn't concede until she'd literally seen the results written on the walls of her headquarters.

As the last calculator was turned off, Dougherty was still incredulous.

"I can't believe it," she whispered to a supporter.

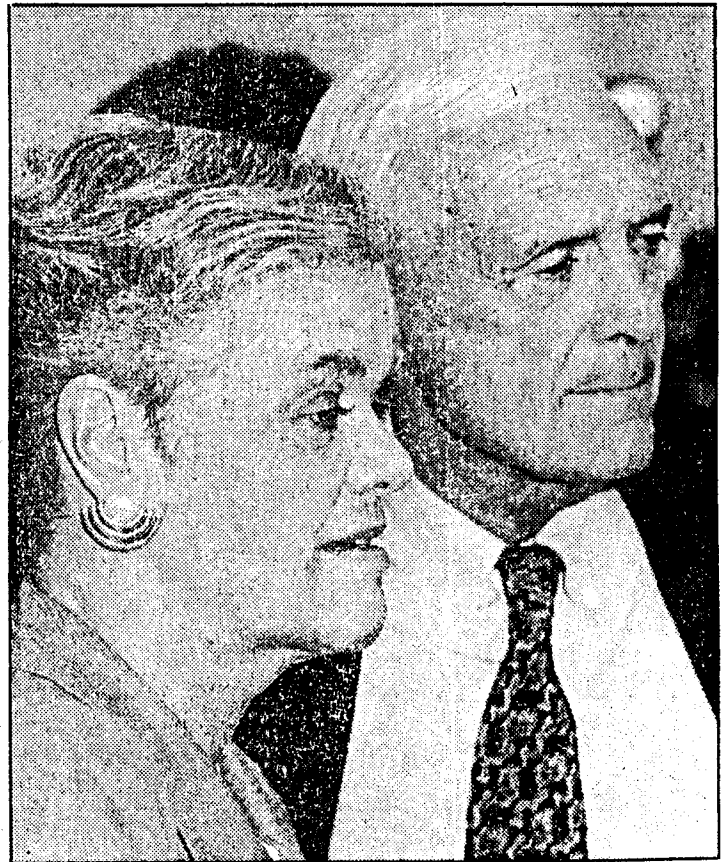
Dougherty, who acknowledged before yesterday's vote that she expected to lose significant support from disgruntled anglophones unhappy with the Liberal government's language policies, maintained that the loss of support wasn't personal.

"For these people, Bill 178 was the last straw. They wanted to give Bourassa a good kick in the pants," she said. "People are so angry they'd vote for anybody or anything else."

She added that she wasn't resentful.

"I don't hold a grudge," she said. "I still think the Liberal Party is the best hope for Quebec."

Dougherty warned of a "negative backlash" coming as the re-

sult of an English-rights party in the national assembly.

The presence of the Equality party in the assembly "could set us back a number of years," Dougherty said.

Dougherty said Equality Party supporters had warned her they would be registering a protest vote and said she might have had better

results had she run as an independent.

Cameron wasn't the slightest bit upset with suggestions that votes coming his way may be votes against the Liberals, not votes for him.

"I'd be content to win on that basis," he said. "It's a protest on intelligent and moral grounds."

President advocates Ugly American policy

The Berlin Wall is tumbling down. Eastern bloc European countries are moving toward free elections, market economies and human rights. Mikhail Gorbachev is being hailed as "the great liberator," a Russian George Washington.

Where's President Bush? Invading Panama.

Former CIA operative Bush is trying to get his hands on his former CIA subordinate: Maximum Leader Manuel Noriega.

A kinder, gentler invasion?

In the late 1950s, a novel called "The Ugly American" was a best-seller. Set in Southeast Asia, this book showed the arrogant meddling of U.S. diplomats and politicians in the affairs of other countries. Naturally, the "best and brightest," the Ivy League aristocrats, ignored the lessons. So "The Ugly American" became history, rather than prophecy.

Third World people want to come to America, but they hate Americans. Why? What's the source of anti-American sentiment? The Ugly Americans — the U.S. government's foreign meddlers; the politicians, diplomats and other U.S. government personnel who bully other governments.

Consider the history of Panama.

It was originally part of Colombia. President Teddy Roosevelt wanted to build a canal through the isthmus. Colombia just said "no."

Roosevelt backed a "revolt" which founded the Republic of Panama. He sent warships to "protect" the new republic. Panama's infant government signed the canal deal. That's the origin of the phrase "gunboat diplomacy."

For years, U.S. government foreign aid (bribes) and military forces (threats) have kept the Panama Canal in our government's hands. Ill will, unrest and riots convinced the U.S. government to turn over the canal to Panama's government.

Under the guise of the United Fruit Co., the CIA had run covert operations in Central and South America since the 1950s. When the CIA blew it, the U.S. government screamed "communism" and increased the threats and bribes.

Needless to say, most of these governments ruled by violence. Is it any wonder the oppressed people hated those who bankrolled and armed their oppressors? Is it any wonder that they hate the real Ugly American — our government?

Like the boy who cried "wolf,"

our federal government found that crying "communism" won't work anymore. So they cry, "Drugs! Noriega sells drugs!" Communism was the drug of the '50s, and drugs are the communism of the '90s. Most people respond like Pavlov's dogs.

Is Panama a clear and present military danger to America's survival? No. Is Noriega likely — or even able — to launch a military attack on California or Texas or Florida? No. What about naval action? Nevada has greater naval strength docked at Lake Mead than Panama can boast. Is Panama more oppressive than Cuba? Than Nicaragua? Not even close.

President Bush wants us to believe he's serious about rooting out evil in our hemisphere. Fine. Where's the invasion of Castro's Cuba? Does the prospect of facing 500,000 battle-seasoned troops perhaps give him pause? What about Nicaragua? Are Daniel Ortega's 300,000-plus loyal soldiers too big an obstacle for Bush? Maybe Noriega's 6,500 troops were something Bush could deal with. The last real fighting man from Panama was Roberto Duran.

Bush wants to walk softly and carry a big stick. But only when the opponent doesn't even have a twig.

Don't examine the Bush argu-

ment too closely. Just say "Noriega sells drugs" until you're really scared. Then close your eyes and say, "He's right."

Isn't it interesting that the Berlin Wall went up under one Ivy League president and came down under another? Neither one did a damn thing about it.

George Bush is an Ivy League Yale elitist, a man who thinks he's qualified to run other people's lives, a bully in a gray flannel suit.

This "gun yacht diplomacy" is the last resort of the civilized meddlers. It's a relic of racism: a legacy of the alleged "white man's burden."

It is not America or the American people that Third World people hate. It's the Ugly American government policy of foreign interventionism.

Lloyd Bentsen pointed out that Dan Quayle is no Jack Kennedy. True. And the bully in the White House is no Teddy Roosevelt. Bush is just a pale Yale imitation — an Ivy League war wimp. Bush is the new Ugly American.
