NJLP CONVENTION MEETINGS

The New Jersey Libertarian Party annual convention business meeting was held on March 10, 1990 at the Days Hotel in New

Brunswick, New Jersey starting at 10:10 AM. Treasurer Lou Stefanelli gave his report then presented the 1990 NJLP Budget to the members. Ken Kaplan noted Lou's "fine job getting us straightened out" which brought hearty applause from the assembly.

Development coordinator Sam Edelston reviewed the year's activities. Sam said he was seriously involved in following up with people interested in the NJLP and has prepared responses to inquiries and mailings to prospects. Operation Political Homeless (OPH) is moving well under the guidance of Chair Michelle Maloney.

Ken Kaplan has finished two "Seminar 1" programs and is working on more. Dan Karlan has a video "Inviting to Seminar One" to loan.

Sam concluded with mention of his local Libertarian Club. The club is running two candidates for Borough Council in Metuchen this year!

The convention then began to consider the problem of inactive county organizations. Dan Karlan noted that the Sussex County Representative to the State Committee failed to renew his NJLP membership so the seat was deleted. Individuals from Hudson, Union, Passaic, Essex, and Bergen counties were identified at the convention for possible future organization activity in these counties.

Three "active" county groups then presented their 1989 accomplishments and 1990 plans.

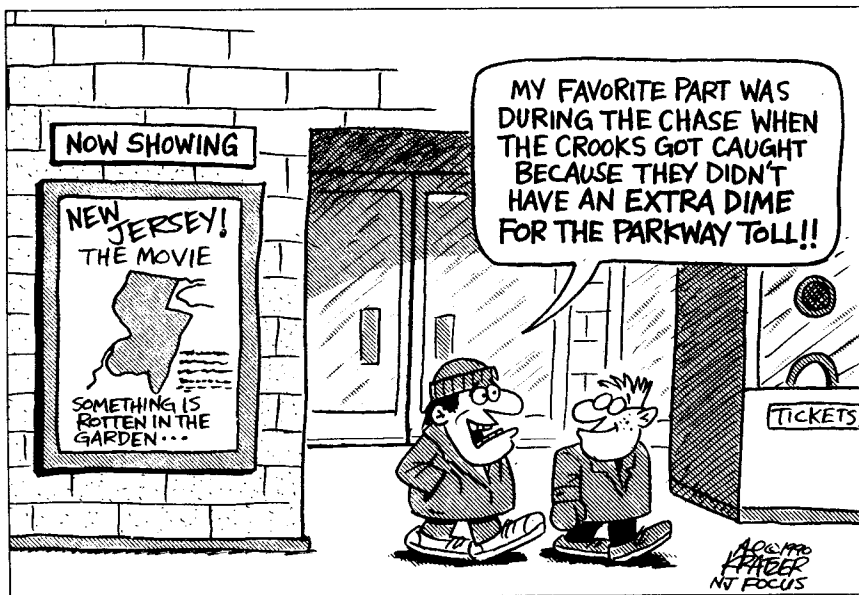

POSITION STATEMENT ON GUN CONTROL LAWS

The primary duty of government should be to protect individuals from those who initiate the use of force against others: muggers, rapists, murderers, etc. Reduction of violent crime requires swift and effective punishment of anyone who uses a weapon to harm peaceful persons and their property. In addition, the right of the citizens of our State to resist violent attacks must be protected. No laws regulating the peaceful and private use of guns can be tolerated. We also affirm the right of self defense.

The New Jersey Libertarian Party (NJLP) advocates the following actions:

- I. The NJLP absolutely opposes so-called "gun control" legislation like N.J. Senate bill S.3285 and similar laws, including all licensing, registration, permits, etc. The ownership of a gun by an individual does not violate the rights of another person.
- II. The NJLP calls for the repeal of all federal, state, and local prohibitions and restrictions on the possession, carrying, ownership, manufacture, sale, and transfer of handguns and other firearms. Such laws include the Federal Gun Control Act of 1968, the National Firearms Act of 1934, and the equivalent New Jersey statutes.
- III. The NJLP supports any peaceful person who chooses to disobey gun control laws -- such as a person who resists criminal assault, possesses unlicensed guns, or carries a weapon without a permit.
- IV. To implement resistance to gun laws, the NJLP will distribute educational materials to notify N.J. residents of their rights including the *Right to Bear Arms* and the principle of jury nullification of unjust laws.

15. THE RIGHT TO KEEP AND BEAR ARMS

Maintaining our belief in the inviolability of the right to keep and bear arms, we oppose all laws at any level of government restricting the ownership, manufacture, transfer, or sale of firearms or ammunition. We oppose all laws requiring registration of firearms or ammunition. We also oppose any government efforts to ban or restrict the use of tear gas, "mace," or other self-protection devices. We further oppose all attempts to ban weapons or ammunition on the grounds that they are risky or unsafe.

We support repeal of the National Firearms Act of 1935 and the Federal Gun Control Act of 1968, and we demand the immediate abolition of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms.

We favor the repeal of laws banning the concealment of weapons or prohibiting pocket weapons. We also oppose the banning of inexpensive handguns ("Saturday night specials").

John Hill reported that the South Jersey Libertarians had two 1989 candidates for Camden County Freeholder. Door-to-door and direct mail promotions both showed up in the vote totals. This year Tom Kerner for Town Council and Jerry Zeldin for Congress will carry the area for the NJLP.

Claudia Montelione reported on the Libertarians of Monmouth County activities. Last year LMC protested against the Immigration and Naturalization Service mass raid at Monmouth Park and the INS proposed detention center in New York. In 1990 LMC has four candidates: Helen Radder for Township Committee, John Skelinger for Boro Council, and Ginny Flynn & Marshall Bienstock for Freeholder. In addition LMC is seeking to gain a space in the Monmouth County Fair this year.

Howard Schoen said that the Somerset/Middlesex Area Libertarians had 150 names on its mailing list because of Operation Political Homeless at the county fair. Two local candidates for Metuchen Boro Council highlight 1990 activities.

The convention then approved candidates for 1990. For Congress the members approved Howard Schoen (6th Congressional District), Jerry Zeldin (1st CD), Bill Stewart (3rd CD), and Carl Peters (12th CD). Initially, no one was nominated to run for U.S. Senate but later the NJLP State Committee selected Lou Stefanelli. (This special meeting consisted of Karlan, Edelston, Schoen, and Flynn with later approvals by Peters, Montelione, and Helen Radder.)

The convention next considered an amendment to the NJLP Bylaws, which would change Section 11's quorum requirements. As amended then approved the change added Part C "County Committees shall

determine their own quorum requirements."

The convention also modified the dues structure in two ways. First, a new dues category of "\$100 Patron" was approved. Then after debate and modification, the current household discount for regular members only was replaced by a new category of "household membership" which allows additional members in the same household for \$5.00 each, without a copy of the New Jersey Libertarian.

The convention business meeting concluded with the election of new NJLP officers. Dan Karlan was reelected Chair over None-of-the-Above. Jerry Zeldin won for Vice Chair over Howard Schoen and NOTA. Len Flynn and Lou Stefanelli crushed NOTA for Secretary and Treasurer, respectively. For At-Large Representatives Helen Radder, Sam Edelston, and Ken Kaplan were selected with NOTA gaining only one vote.

Following Ken Kaplan's announcement of the next day's St. Patrick's Day parade in West Orange, the meeting adjourned at 1:00 PM. The State Committee met immediately after the general meeting during lunch at a local tavern. Present were Karlan, Zeldin, Stefanelli, Flynn, Radder, Kaplan, Edelston, Schoen, Hill, Peters, and Montelione. Harris, Meinshausen, Kerr, Novack, and Agnew were absent.

Dan Karlan announced future meeting dates for the entire year then presented his "rules" for calling Steering or State Committee meetings to order and handling quorum. The group nominated and elected Dan Karlan, Ken Kaplan, and Claudia Montelione as NJLP Trustees over NOTA.

The committee voted unanimously to spend \$30 to pay the admission fee for an Operation Political Homeless table at the Trenton Computer Fair on April 21 & 22, 1990.

Thousands rally and

Waving protest signs and American flags, thousands of gun enthusiasts rallied in Trenton yesterday to denounce a bill that would effectively ban semi-automatic "assault" firearms.

Speaker after speaker told the overflow crowd that the bill goes far beyond threatening the property rights of citizens who own 100,000 to 300,000 assault firearms, according to State Police estimates. Rally leaders described the legislation as nothing less than a frontal assault on the right to bear arms, which one hailed as "the spine of all freedom."

But the man they most needed to impress, Gov. Jim Florio, was in Newark preaching about the need to "make the state safer" by "taking the assault weapons out of circulation."

"These are weapons of war and they do not belong in New Jersey," Florio said at a press conference on the steps of the old Essex County Courthouse.

The Governor emphasized that the legislation would not ban all semi-automatic firearms but only "a few weapons" that "have no legitimate use to anyone but soldiers in combat."

But J. Warren Cassidy, executive vice president of the National Rifle Association (NRA), warned the Trenton protesters that gun control advocates would stop at nothing short of "the ban-

ning of private ownership of firearms."

Roy Innis, chairman of the Congress of Racial Equality, said the proposed restrictions on assault weapons were merely "a beachhead" on the way

to enacting more pervasive gun control. He stressed that other civil rights cannot be separated from "the most fundamental of all civil rights, gun rights."

"Any bill that would violate

After Howard Schoen questioned the precedent for the payment, a motion to reimburse Howard \$200 for the SMAL table at the county fair was tabled unanimously until the April 7, 1990 meeting. The committee adjourned at 2:00 PM.

RALLY FOR GUN RIGHTS

Thousands protest proposed ban on assault weapons

filled the courtyard of the Statehouse Annex and spilled out onto West State Street. State Police estimated the crowd at 3,000; rally organizers claimed more than twice that number.

To underscore the justness of their cause, protesters employed symbols of patriotism—from Old Glory and veterans caps to a fife-and-drum corps that played the national anthem.

Numerous speakers extolled the private ownership of firearms as a bulwark against oppression, either by government or the criminals who will have firearms in any case.

"Because the unlawful have guns and cannot be made to give them up, we must have them and won't give them up," said Mark Benenson, former American chairman of Amnesty International. He added that 16 years with the organization convinced him "that all governments—even supposedly democratic governments—can't be trusted."

Barbara Nappen of Ocean Township, an NRA life member and firearms instructor, declared, "It is the Second Amendment (the right to bear arms) that is the spine of all freedom."

Florio, re-emphasizing his often-stated theme that without the "right to be safe" nothing else matters much, said assault firearms have become "the weapon of choice of drug dealers." That development, he said, "poses grave danger to police who are 'outgunned' and to citizens literally caught in the crossfire."

Flanked by about 100 law enforcement officers and elected officials, Florio said the state owes it to its police to enact the nation's toughest law on assault weapons.

Essex County Sheriff Thomas D'Alessio, who introduced Florio, said his men confiscated 30 to 40 assault firearms last year, mostly during drug raids.

"We in law enforcement stand together believing these guns should be banned," D'Alessio said.

In Trenton, however, Patrolman Jon Schramm of Washington Township, Warren County, presented a petition signed by 2,000 law enforcement officers opposing the assault weapons bill.

"All it's going to do is generate disrespect for law enforcement by law-abiding gun owners," Schramm said, drawing a huge cheer from the crowd.

Several speakers contended that "law-abiding citizens" would be the only ones hurt if the assault firearms

ban becomes law, because criminals will simply disobey it.

"Criminals don't go through the legal channels for the right to obtain weapons—so why take away the rights of those who do?" Assemblyman Nicholas Felice (R-Bergen), one of several legislators to address the rally, asked.

The bill (S-166), sponsored by the late Sen. Frank Graves (D-Passaic) and championed by Sen. John Russo (D-Ocean), is awaiting a vote in the Senate. It would require owners of semi-automatic firearms classified as "assault" weapons to qualify for a machinegun permit. The test is so tough that no one in the state has such a permit.

Numerous signs and speakers lauded the bill "confiscatory" because it offers no payment to owners of assault

weapons who fail to qualify for permits to keep them. The bill would allow such persons to sell their assault firearms or keep them if they render them "permanently inoperable."

To Bob Newbery of Livingston, that last option is the equivalent of putting the family dog to sleep and having it stuffed.

Newbery said he is entertaining "serious considerations of relocating to Virginia" and he is not even sure if any of his firearms qualify as assault weapons. The final list, based on magazine capacity and barrel length, would be promulgated by the attorney general.

Both supporters and opponents of the gun control bill had stories of confrontations with armed criminals.

Immis said his belief that law-abiding citizens must have access to guns was reinforced when his two sons were shot to death in "crazy, criminal acts" in Harlem and the Bronx. Literally and figuratively, he embraced 82-year-old Annie Ryan, who shot an intruder in her Trenton home last year, as an example of how a gun in the right hands can stop crime.

Rodney Patterson, 21, of Newark, endorsed Florio's view that assault firearms exacerbate the drug scourge. As he spoke, Patterson lifted his sweater to show a series of scars he described as the result of being shot by a crack seller during a robbery attempt two years ago.

"I'm a victim of what he (Florio) is talking about," Patterson said.

The Right to Defend Yourself and Others Rally
(altho they didn't call it that)

In New Jersey, formerly The Garden State - now The POLICE State, we are fighting S.166 and A.3, the so-called assault rifle bills. A protest rally was planned for March 19th, the day S.166 was to be introduced. As I drove toward the State House Annex, I noticed that many of the pedestrians and motorists did not resemble the usual State employees. I parked and asked someone for directions. He was wearing an NRA cap! My first sight of the crowd made me return to my car for my camera.

What a great assortment of signs! Many had clever slogans I'd never seen before. My favorite: "The Second Amendment is not about Crime or Sport; it is about INSURANCE." Insurance against a state gone mad with power. I complimented the bearer. "I thought it up" he replied. Other signs asked "WHERE IS THE A.C.L.U.?" and "Today the Second, Tomorrow the First?"

As I scurried about taking pictures, I realized, Hey, it's a beautiful day! The crowd had filled the yard and continued to grow until the street was blocked off. Estimates ranged from six to nine thousand people. They didn't look like typical New Jerseyans; they looked like...Americans! One woman was passing out teabags to be sent to Governor Florio. It didn't cost me anything to send mine; I used a recycled stamp. I complimented her on her outfit, a colorful peasant skirt and a red satin club jacket. She replied "I always dress for the occasion." So had I. Someone complimented me on my Afghan vest. Which, of course, was why I wore it; it was appropriate and an excellent conversation starter.

Speakers included several politicians. Even tho they're on our side on this issue I just can't think of them as "public servants". There were the usual representatives of gun owners' rights groups, including J. Warren Cassidy, Exec VP of the NRA. There were welcome surprises: someone from Amnesty International, and Roy Innes. Roy Innes of C.O.R.E.! The same day The Trentonian's cover showed an elderly Black woman who had defended herself by shooting a burglar with her .38. "I shot at his legs 'cause I didn't want to kill him. I just didn't want him to kill me. The way the world is today, I couldn't live without my gun." So much for the Liberal claim that Blacks would be safer with gun prohibition. Her gun appeared to be a quality, expensive one, but many people can afford only cheap, so-called Saturday-night Specials.

A handout listed the "swing" votes. I have always felt that we should focus on them. Two were crossed out. "What about these?" "They're on our side now." Awright!

Fellow Libertarian Len Flynn wore his name tag from the Convention. An excellent idea! Carl Peters also was gathering signatures and had had people request information. I spoke with several people and offered them my limited supply of LP literature. We should always have some available when gathering signatures. (Giving out copies of our platform may not be a good idea. Most people can find something in it that greatly upsets them.) Comments like "I've been wanting to contact you" were encouraging, but...how long will it be until we are speaking at similar rallies? I told the tv crews "I can't image how the station could make us look bad, but I'm sure they'll try." That

night I did see one report on ABC, which was so brief I would have missed it if I'd sneezed.

We gave it our best shot. One normal-looking guy said "I wish they'd pass it, so we can get on with the revolution." Altho it was alluded to, the only truism I didn't hear was "The time to use your guns against The Government is when they come to take your guns."

The next day, it occurred to me, Eureka! that "If guns are outlawed, only outlaws AND CRIMINALS will have guns". If we say "only outlaws have guns", then criminals are lumped together with them (us). There IS a difference! We should emphasize this. Will a new slogan make any difference? Let's try it and see!

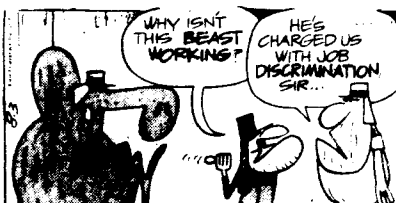

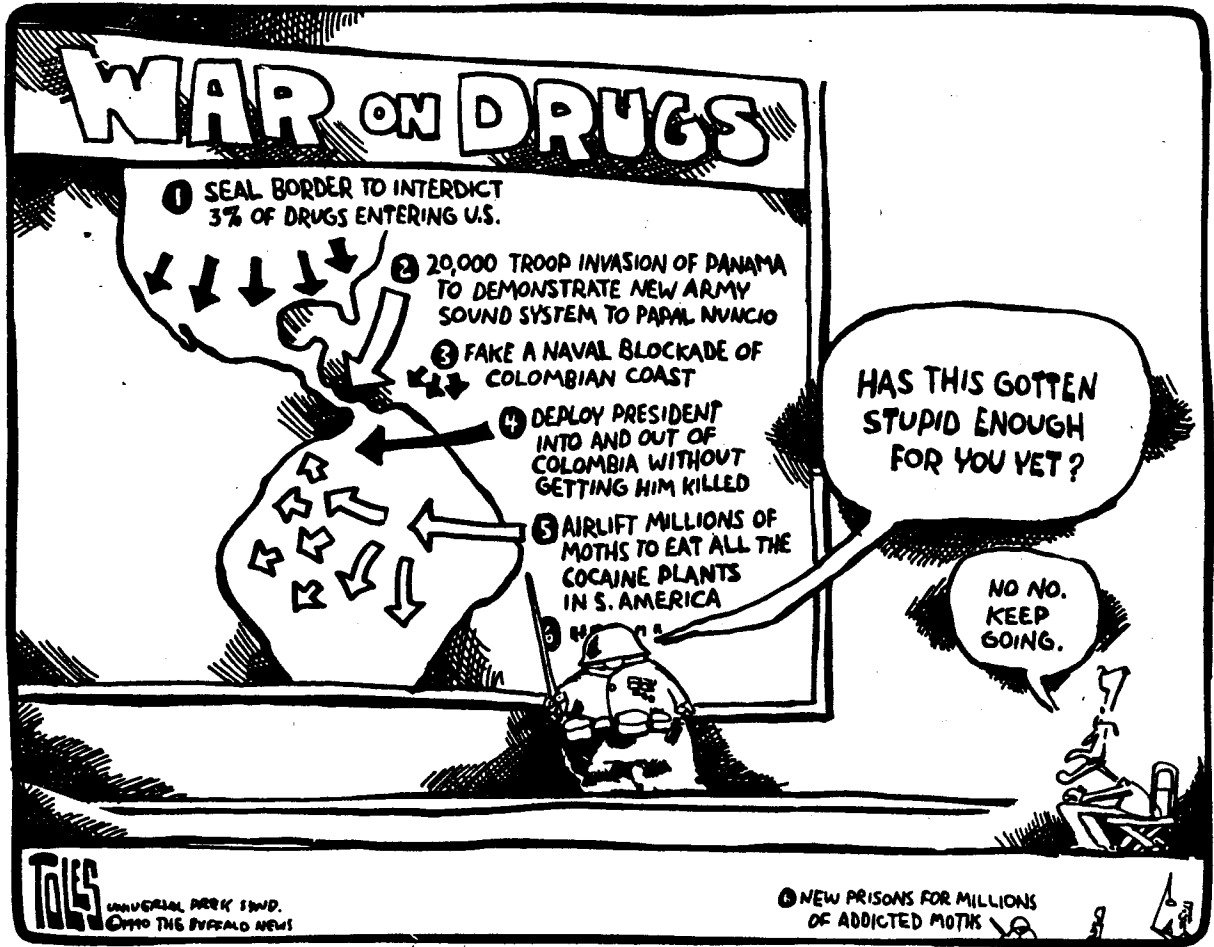
