NJLF General Meeting: Education and Exercise

On Saturday, July 29, 1978 three dozen libertarians gathered at my home to discuss the foibles of government education and to revive latent muscles. NJLP Vice Chairman Dale Sutthoff opened the afternoon program with a libertarian review of the Fackwood-Moynihan tax credit bill (a summary of Dale's presentation will appear next issue.)

Then Fritz Davis, editor of the Jersey Devil, spoke on the efforts of the citizens of New Egypt, NJ to get rid of their spendthrift and arrogant local school board. He described the overwhelming 3-1 victory of two write-in candidates over their incumbent opponents in the last election, Then Fritz told of the incredible insensitivity shown by the three remaining school board members to the massive voter repudiation of their bungling of the local school's affairs. The next election (Feb. 1979) will put the swing seat up for grabs.

Fritz described now badly their local school had declined. School taxes have trebled in 8 years, while educational quality plummeted. (Sound familiar?) He concluded by telling his listeners of a reknowned private academy which existed in New Egypt during the 1890's. Every year the entire graduating class was accepted by Princeton University, according to the New Egypt Historical Society. What a contrast to the present!

The meeting ended with a spirited volleyball game on a non-regulation size court (Down with regulations!). The NJLP State Committee sure has some fearsome volleyball players. Could you please pass me the Ben-Gay, dear?

YOU'RE NOT ALONE ANY MORE

Editor, Libertarian:

The government of Monmouth County recently met with some unanticiated resistance to its plan to inprove" the County's highway system by widening into 5 lanes a 1.7 rele segment of a 2 lane county road, Rt. 537). Despite the rubber stamp of approval given the project by the rederal Highway Authority, the New resey Department of Transportation, the Conmouth County Board of Chosen recholders, the Colts Neck Township committee, and the Freehold Township committee, NJLP's Macron family ruestioned the wisdom of those who riewed the proposal as an improvement.

ents, (most of whom were not advised of the project since they would not suffer the direct loss of land and were thus deemed by the state to be enaffected), we stressed the practical disadvantages of the proposal in terms of air and noise pollution, property values, safety and traffic control.

four opposition quickly gained support from everyone we approached. We received excellent press coverage and were able in a three week period, to cause both townships to rescind their resolutions in support of the project. The battle against the county is now being carried on by area residents who formed a Homeowners Association at an informal meeting of about 50 people in our home.

In comparison with the cool response received when petitioning in the same neighborhoods for libertarian purposes, I was truly amazed by the strong anti-government sentiments I encountered during this episode.

I think the difference may be accounted for by the fact that most people to not feel directly threatened by most of what government does. When people are made aware of the threats to their own self-intrest, they will act! The problem of course is that many of these threats are neither as

visible nor as unanimously unappealing as the prospect of a 5 lane highway through a residential area.

As libertarians, we are more sensitive than most to the excesses of government action but I don't think that the passive acceptance of excesses by most people is any indication of their approval or disapproval. Rather it indicates their failure to grasp any relationship between government action and their own welfare. When they do perceive some connection they are quick to do something about it. Therefore, I believe that libertarians should become involved in local controversies. They provide an excellent atmosphere for the successful introduction of libertarian principles because people can be convinced both that they are affected and that they can be effective. Further, the scope of such controversies is such that 2 or 3 active individuals can take the lead as spokesmen for large groups of voters.


We of the Libertarian Party are both anti-tax activists and accountable to the voters. Anyone can ask our position on government and taxes, which we have consistently held.

Now that the dust has settled somewhat and Proposition 13 has become law in California, and a growing movement throughout the rest of the country, the time has come to sort out a few things left hanging.

First, there is the widespread idea that Proposition 13 was a blind lashing out, a rather mindless reaction without too much thought behind it. Don't you believe it! Howard Jarvis and his people had been planning this one for a long, long time and they know exactly what the next steps are.

Proposition 13 is part of an ongoing process which eventually will not only lower taxes across the country on all levels of government but will also limit and restrict the powers of government. Too many people are calling it a "tax revolt" to change terms now, but a better name would have been "limited government movement."

This brings up another point. A great many people, including reporters, columnists, and commentators, still do not seem to have grasped what is happening. They keep asking, in one way or another, "How do the tax reform people intend to fund all the government programs if they cut back on the taxes?"

In fact, the other day the J.D. saw an ad in the paper pushing a new book by one Jude Wanniski, Associate Editor of the Wall Street Journal. Entitled, The Way the World Works, it is labeled in the ad, "The Manifesto of the Taxpayer's Revolt" and purportedly "demonstrates that taxes can be cut without cutting social spending." If this is an accurate description of the book, the author has missed the brass ring.

We don't want that "social spending" and all the bureaucratic interference, red tape, and outright oppression that goes with it, even if we could afford it. We no longer believe that government or its representatives have the right to run our lives, to appropriate the money we earn and spend it to suit themselves, if not for their own benefit. If the people have the sense to earn the money in the first place, they will know how it should be spent. And absolutely no one else has any moral right to give it away.

Then there's the race issue which Sen. McGovern and others have raised concerning the aims of the tax reform movement. Since welfare programs would have to be cut back or eliminated, those who think this way assume that tax reform is directed against blacks. Neither will the old politician's ploy of cutting back on essential services first, such as police or firemen, to scare the public away from tax reform, create the customary diversion this time. Threadbare from having been pulled too often, the public is seeing through it already and smart politicians will look for another gag.

One of the great American folk-sayings of recent years has been, "It just can't go on like this!" It was more of a prophecy than a lament for finally something has begun to happen to break that vicious cycle of bureaucracy-taxes-inflation-decline which has had us in its grip for so long. True, the road ahead may be no less rocky than the one we've been traveling, but it goes up!

If all goes as planned, there will be some financial incentive for anyone who submits typed or handwritten articles but for now, all that is needed is a deluge of good clippings.



Probably no other term describes the Social Security program so aptly. It has proven to be one of the shabbiest deals of FDR's 1930s New Dealism. It is costly, pervasive, deceptive and destructive to the aged, workers, and youth alike. It represents the single biggest financial threat to *your* future. And the worst is yet to come.



Statement of Principles

We, the members of the Libertarian Party, challenge the cult of the omnipotent state and defend the rights of the individual.

We hold that all individuals have the right to exercise sole dominion over their own lives, and have the right to live in whatever manner they choose, so long as they do not forcibly interfere with the equal right of others to live in whatever manner they choose.

Governments throughout history have regularly operated on the opposite principle, that the State has the right to dispose of the lives of individuals and the fruits of their labor. Even within the United States, all political parties other than our own grant to government the right to regulate the lives of individuals and seize the fruits of their labor without their consent.

We, on the contrary, deny the right of any government to do these things, and hold that where governments exist, they must not violate the rights of any individual: namely, (1) the right to life—accordingly we support prohibition of the initiation of physical force against others; (2) the right to liberty of speech and action—accordingly we oppose all attempts by government to abridge the freedom of speech and press, as well as government censorship in any form; and (3) the right to property—accordingly we oppose all government interference with private property, such as confiscation, nationalization, and eminent domain, and support the prohibition of robbery, trespass, fraud, and misrepresentation.

Since governments, when instituted, must not violate individual rights, we oppose all interference by government in the areas of voluntary and contractual relations among individuals. People should not be forced to sacrifice their lives and property for the benefit of others. They should be left free by government to deal with one another as free traders; and the resultant economic system, the only one compatible with the protection of individual rights, is the free market.
