# Gun Buybacks— The Fatal Flaw

The gun used to kill a 31 year old Pennsauken man in January of this year had just been purchased with \$50 that a young criminal received in exchange for a *nonworking* shotgun. The youth bought a 25 caliber semiautomatic handgun from a man who was about to enter the police station to turn in his weapon for cash.

Edward F. Borden Jr. the Camden County prosecutor defended the gun amnesty program, saying it had helped cut the number of guns on the street. Apparently we are all a lot safer if criminals can turn in weapons that don't work in exchange for the cash necessary to update their arsenal!

This program and others like it are based on a Fatal Flaw. The notion that guns cause crime, as opposed to criminals.

Apparently police and others involved in such programs aren't asking any questions whatsoever of anyone turning in their weapons, working or not, for cash. Perhaps one question they might ask is, "Are you the rightful owner of this weapon?" It seems to me that the state is guilty of running fencing operations, if they don't ask this simple but important question. Street value for a functioning weapon is much higher than the \$50 the police offer, the question becomes who can afford to accept \$50 for a weapon that costs much more except for those who either turn in a broken weapon, or those who didn't incur the cost, because they simply didn't pay for the weapon?

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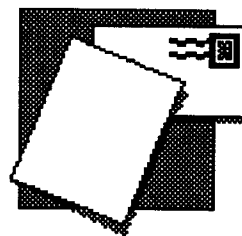

*The following editorial appeared in the August 1, 1994 Home News.*

"This is a strong call to abolish the federal inheritance tax, by which Uncle Sam essentially makes himself half-owner of our properties, businesses, and whatever comprises our estates when our lives are over.

"It's clearly unfair. The government does very little to help us build our nest eggs during our lives, but when we're gone, it makes sure it gets its 40 to 50 percent of everything we've worked for.

"As an insurance agent, I have too many opportunities to see the worry the tax causes. Farmers fear the land they've worked all their lives will have to be sold at fire sale price so sons and daughters can pay the inheritance tax. Small business owners, where

Mom and Dad were so pleased to bring the

children into the operation, fear the firm will go belly-up because of the inheritance tax.

"Worse, some of those aware of the awful consequences of the federal inheritance tax try to protect their heirs by paying extremely high insurance rates, the cost of which often prevents them from re-investing in the land or the business.

"Others try to squirrel money away some how, and risk IRS punishment and penalties. Still others consign their life's fortune to their children and live almost in poverty. This is all to avoid Uncle Sam from becoming the partner you never knew you had.

"And what does the federal government do with this blood money? It funds many programs neither you nor I would find productive, socially meaningful or beneficial. In short, it is of no direct use to us, although that money was earned by our

sweat and, not infrequently, a lot of blood.

"As a state assemblyman in 1967, I campaigned for abolishing the state inheritance tax. Because it was unduly burdensome, it was voted out of existence by men and women of conscience. So should the federal inheritance tax be killed. The money people earn honestly should be allowed to pass to our children or anyone of our choice without a 50 percent cut going to Uncle Sam."

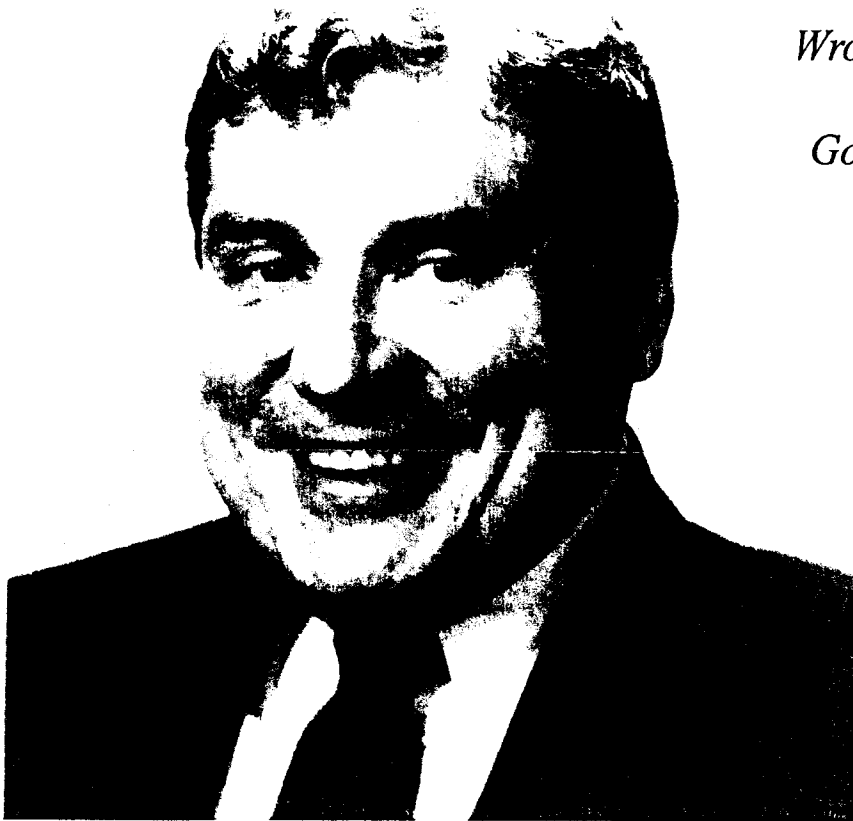

# Gene Burns is Coming to Chatham

Radio talk show host to speak at Fairmount Country Club

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CHATHAM TOWNSHIP. - Gene Burns the nationally syndicated radio talk show host, is coming to Chatham Township on October 7. He will address residents and guests of the Austin Lett for Chatham Township Committee at the Fairmount Country Club. Mr. Burns' topic for the evening will be "Wrong Question - Bad Answer: The Nature and Role of Government in a Free Society".

Burns is known for his wry wit and ability to isolate the nonsense from what passes for conventional wisdom in politics. He is equally at home exposing the foibles of both left and right, regularly taking politicians to task for promising more than anyone could deliver. His scintillating analysis of the issues of the day is as respectful of his callers as it is illuminating to his listeners.

Hailing from New Brunswick, New Jersey, Burns began his career in radio news, but moved to talk radio in 1967 in Baltimore Maryland. In 1985, he moved his local program to Boston. The program became so popular it launched Burns into the national spotlight. His

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program is now carried by the WOR Radio Network and broadcast in 150 radio markets around the country.

Burns is lending his support to Austin Lett because the candidate agrees with Burns that most of the problems we are experiencing today stem from two primary causes: A

failure of the people to take responsibility for themselves, and a failure of government to appreciate its limitations and respect the rights of its citizens.

Lett is running an independent campaign for a seat on the Township Committee. His primary goal is to restore competition to local politics and, consequently, increase the accountability of public officials to their constituents. His campaign is being supported by Republicans, Democrats, and Independents who want to see an expansion of political discourse and consideration of new ideas and solutions.

Tickets to the Gene Burns event are \$100 per person, including dinner. Proceeds will benefit the Austin Lett campaign.

I suggested that electing people to office is a good way to get our policies implemented and Ron asks “What policies?, What strategies?” Do I have to reiterate the entire libertarian philosophy every time I suggest strategies and techniques for getting our candidates elected? Ron seems to think that I would be at home in the Bill Clinton or George Bush camp. I can only be offended at the very idea.

Ron says “getting the public with you is done in many ways without actually holding office. Witness the NEA, AFL-CIO, AMA, NAACP, all minorities.” Does he really believe that the AFL-CIO is winning people over with their ideas and not their money or votes?

He’s got to be kidding! These groups succeed precisely because they deliver money and votes. Can we? Would we want to? Is Ron actually suggesting that we become a special interest group and provide either votes or money to Republican and Democratic candidates? If he doesn’t know that this is the way it works than he is a perfect example of the point I was trying to make about competence.

Ron takes me to task for suggesting that our candidates need to be qualified to be in office. Does Ron think the only qualification necessary is to hold libertarian ideals? It is certainly the most important qualification. But when did it become the only qualification? Are we saying that we don’t care if the people who represent our viewpoint are capable of representing it well? That we don’t mind if they screw up or embarrass our party, so long as they believe the same things we do? I certainly hope not.

Ron finishes his article by indicating that our party shouldn’t get “so

caught up in the actual election of specific party labels.” I only wish it would. Exactly who have we elected lately to anything? Ron, this is the Libertarian Party, not the Libertarian Discussion group, or the Libertarian Club. It’s job is to elect Libertarians to office. There are over a hundred different Libertarian organizations whose job it is to educate, or to lobby, or some other activity, but there is only one Libertarian Party.

If you don’t want to work to elect libertarians to office you certainly don’t have to. But could you at least stop jogging the elbow of those of us who do? You could join the Advocates for Self Government, or support CATO or the REASON foundation to name only a few. Here at the Libertarian Party, the debate should be over how best to get libertarians elected to office, not whether or not we should even try.

## Meeting of the N.J. Libertarian Party Steering Committee of August 21, 1994

The chairman called the meeting to order at Glenn Campbell's house, Manahawkin, at 1:14 pm. Present: Layman, Flynn, Ellett, Stefanelli, Campbell, Grindlinger, Paff, Quarles (newly nominated by petition) and Jeanne Macron. Absent: Muentz.

The minutes of the General Meeting of July 3 were accepted; the treasurer's report was received.

### Old Business.

**By-laws & Election of County Representatives.** Stefanelli reported that the by-law changes authorized by the Convention have generally been implemented. The recently elected county representatives are Andrew Savicky, Gloucester; Joan Eden, Hudson; Carl Peters, Mercer; Fred Glatter, Middlesex; Elizabeth Macron, Ocean; Miranda Mehaffey, Salem; Frank Girardeau, Somerset; Ed Wiessmann, Sussex. Monmouth's representative will be chosen Sept. 9. Thus, 9 of the 21 counties will be represented on the State board.

**Membership.** Campbell reported that the Monmouth County Fair generated a list of 124 interested individuals, all of whom will be contacted. Ocean county will run an OPH booth at OCC College in Sept. *Freedom Daily* subscribers have been invited to the Freedom Day rally, where they will be asked to join the NJLP.

**Fund Raising.** Muentz' "Campaign 95" letter will be mailed after the Nov. election. Ellett will price 5,000 #9 business return envelopes with the NJLP's address and indicia; and Flynn will research the post office's handling

charge for BREs. A telemarketer is drafting a proposal for our consideration.

**Cable TV Show.** Ellett reported that Ocean will be airing Shad Woolley's "A Third Point of View" on a station that covers Long Beach Island; this is the third station to carry the show. Ellett is negotiating with the National Endowment for Liberty to air their 13-program "At Issue" series. Several counties and individuals are contacting CATV stations in their coverage areas. Woolley will nominate particularly important shows for reproduction by the party; \$100 has been authorized.

**Media Relations & Publicity.** Paff and Wiessmann are working to get a NJ paper to carry a libertarian columnist or cartoonist. One plan is to convince a syndicator to run a column like Walter Williams' in the *NJ Libertarian*, the idea being that members will then urge their local paper to carry it.

**Electoral Strategy.** Layman will meet with the Coalition of NJ Sportsmen to discuss a possible Assembly race next year.

**Campaigns.** Grindlinger, U.S. Senate, has addressed Hands Across NJ, and UWSA groups; he has a fund raiser, Freedom Day, planned Aug. 27. Roger Bacon, 5th Congr. district, has a booth at the Warren County Farmers' Fair. Austin Lett, Chatham Township Council, has received favorable press coverage; has been endorsed by a Republican politician from a neighboring town; and has arranged for Gene Burns to host a \$100 per head fundraiser Oct. 7. He also has dropped a 500 piece mailing cross-referenced to the voter

database, thanking those who flew the flag July 4. There was no report on the campaigns of Robert Heitner, Sussex county freeholder, and Scott Derby, Cumberland county clerk. **Meeting with Gov. Whitman's Staff.** Layman will meet with staffers to discuss tort reform, privatization and financing education. Paff volunteered to assist in tort reform; Ellett noted that in some instances tort reform is being used as a cover to weaken trial by jury. **RESOLVED**, that the NJLP spend no more than \$50 to purchase libertarian think tank issue papers addressing the three topics to be discussed. **PASSED.** Quarles will arrange the purchase.

### New Business.

**1995 Convention.** Campbell and Stefanelli volunteered to assist in the planning.

**Project HealthyChoice.** The Libertarians of Monmouth County mailed 1,000 businesses a packet consisting of a cover letter with tear-off donation form, the LP's PHC brochure, an ISIL brochure on the Clinton plan, a resolution for Chamber of Commerce members urging their Chambers to consider a free market approach, and a return envelope for contributions. To date LMC has received a one-cent donation with a note that they should support the President. (A possible explanation for the poor return is that while there was space for a signature on the re-designed membership form, there was no room for the person's name or address.) **Operation Safe Streets.** OSS is the LP's anti-crime outreach project. **RESOLVED**, that the NJLP purchase ten OSS kits for

use by county representatives. **PASSED** unanimously. Paff will draft the cover letter. Campbell will brainstorm action plan alternatives and present them to the State Board.

The State Party as a Resource for the Counties. Flynn, Paff and Ellett will tailor the membership panel of the four LP pamphlets to the NJLP's use. They will also price quantity buys, and present their findings to the next State board meeting in anticipation that the counties will wish to purchase pamphlets for their use. Campbell read E. Macron's objections to the gun pamphlet; Layman will convey them to the LP. **RESOLVED**, that the proposal to purchase 100 copies of *Patient Power* meeting. **PASSED.** -- **RESOLVED**, that the NJLP purchase 3,000 tip carts at a price NTE \$110. **PASSED.** -- **RESOLVED**, that the NJLP purchase 100 bumper stickers with the LP's toll free number. **PASSED.**

**By-laws Change.** Campbell will chair a committee of himself, Paff and Flynn to discuss Paff's proposal to clarify the purpose of the Steering Committee and State Board.

### Announcements.

**Freedom Day** will be held in Jackson, Aug. 27. Contact Campbell for information.

The **State Board** will meet Sept. 18 at Paff's house.

**Gene Burns' fundraiser** for Austin Lett will be on Oct. 7.

**Lending Library.** Thanks to Keith Quarles we have a copy of the videotape *Ayn Rand Speaks for Herself*.

Meeting adjourned at 5:22 pm. Respectfully submitted, Emerson Ellett, Secretary.
