

NJ MILK INDUSTRY REGULATED FOR ANOTHER FIVE YEARS

TRENTON: The state Department of Agriculture's Division of Dairy and Commodity Regulation re-adopted the state's milk price control regulations for another five years. The current regulations (N.J.A.C. 2:53), set to expire on January 10, 1996, were re-adopted without change. The Division, created by New Jersey's Milk Control Act (N.J.S. 4:12A) in 1941, is empowered to fix minimum and maximum prices, and otherwise regulate the sale of milk.

In a statement published in the November 20, 1995 New

Jersey Register, Division Director Dhun B. Patel, Ph.D, stated that "failure to re-adopt these rules would leave a void in the milk control program and could result in unstable markets and destructive competition." Later in the statement, Patel claimed that the rules are "an important tool in insuring that the dairy industry continues to be perceived as a wholesome and consumer friendly industry helping to preserve the dairy industry in New Jersey."

Patel stressed that retail stores "benefit from the maintenance of a stable competitive marketplace" created by the rules while downplaying the record-

keeping and reporting burdens that the regulations impose. For example, sub-

chapter seven of the regulations requires a retailer to file a "Notice of Intent to Change Suppliers" each time the retailer wishes to buy its milk from a different vendor.

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Libertarian Ranks Growing

WASHINGTON, DC: The Libertarian Party achieved a triple breakthrough, setting new records for the number of contributing members, registered voters, and Libertarians in office. "The Libertarian Party is definitely on a roll!" said LP National Director Perry Willis.

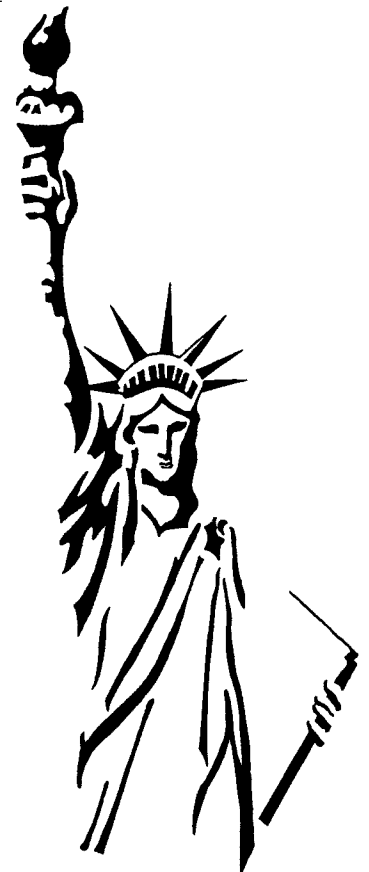
According to party records, there are now:

- 14,031 contributing Libertarian Party members -- an all-time high. That represents an increase of almost 5% in the last month, and a 33% increase since early 1995.
- 164 Libertarians serving in public office -- an all-time high. That represents a 26% increase from early 1995.

The list of Libertarian Party members in elected or appointed office now includes one State Representative in New Hampshire, one mayor in California, and more than 30 city or town council members around the country. "These 164 Libertarians are our Farm Team," said Willis. "These are the people who give us credibility and who will someday win election to state legislatures and eventually Congress. They are laying the foundation for our future Libertarian majority."

Also, according to figures released by Richard Winger, editor of Ballot Access News, the number of registered Libertarians has reached an all-time high: 123,000. That represents a 13% increase since 1994, the last time figures were available.

Willis said this triple score - record numbers of members, registered voters, and Libertarians in office - confirms the political strategy the party has been following for the past two years. "Our strategy has been to build membership, and everything else will follow," he said. "This growth is giving us the resources we need to succeed as America's Third Party."

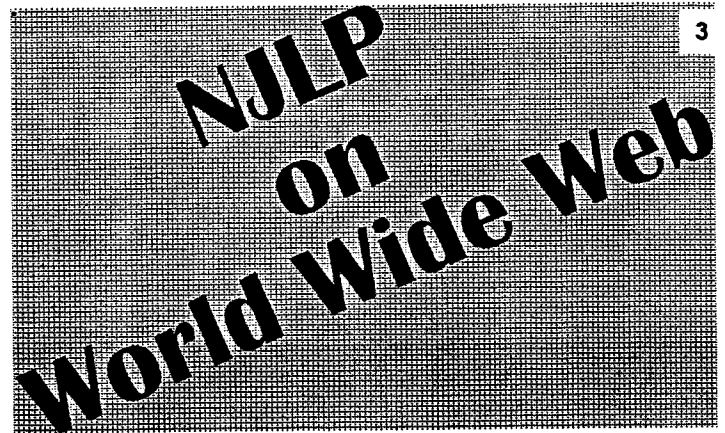

NJ FORFEITURE HEARING SCHEDULED

TRENTON: Louis Kosco, Chairman of the New Jersey Senate Law and Public Safety Committee, has announced that his committee will hold the second of two asset forfeiture hearings on Thursday, March 14, 1996, 10 A.M., at the State House Annex in Trenton.

Kosco held the first hearing on December 11, 1995 after reading in the October 1, 1995 Bergen Record that prosecutors were misusing forfeited assets. Afterwards another story appeared in December 31st's Record that told how prosecutors used thousands of dollars in forfeited cash to hire Mr. Peanut and a Marilyn Monroe lookalike to entertain them and their families at the prosecutors' Atlantic City conventions. The story gave other examples of patent abuse and pointed out that less than

1% of convention expenses went for educational programs.

At the December 11th hearing, Kosco grilled the prosecutors and representatives from the state Attorney General's office. He

suggested that he may introduce a bill that would require all forfeited assets to go to the general treasury. Currently, the forfeited money is given to the prosecutors who spend it on

programs that they decide promote "law enforcement purposes" (such as the lavish conventions). County Prosecutor Association President Sharon Ransavage strongly opposed this suggestion testifying that it would "hold the law enforcement community hostage to the budgetary process."

The prosecutors are clearly on the defensive. We have an opportunity here to make a serious dent in their asset forfeiture program. PLEASE set aside a day to attend the March 14th hearing. Testify if you can, but your presence alone will have an impact.

The media will be there, and they will report on the number of citizens who attend. A large crowd will move this story from page 4 to page 1.

If you plan to attend, you should call the committee at 609/984-0231 the day before

the hearing to ascertain the hearing room number and to make sure that there hasn't been a last minute scheduling change.

The chairman called the meeting to order at Tumulty's Pub, New Brunswick, at 1:22 pm. Absent: Bryant, Dondes, Howley, Mecum, Pewarce and Peters.

The minutes of the Steering Committee meeting of Dec. 17, 1995 were accepted, and the treasurer's report for the General fund was received. As of Dec. 31, 1995 the NJLP had 486 Libertarian Party members, which entitles N.J. to 25 delegates to the national convention, and one representative on the Platform committee.

Standing committee reports:

Recruitment & membership. Saint-Andre, Stefanelli and Karlan are developing procedures for replying to callers to the 800 number. Contacts are needed in each county to follow up after the initial mailing. A coordinator is needed to manage the effort state-wide. In addition to the committee members Buoncristiano, E. Macron and Wiessmann volunteered as local contacts.

Fund raising. Buoncristiano will submit a proposal to buy Harry Browne's *Why Government Doesn't Work*, at a discount, for re-sale.

Public relations. Flynn has a letter to the editor in the

Ongoing business and ad hoc committee reports: 1995 candidates. The critique of the Chatham Township Committee race is on-going.

By-laws. RESOLVED, that the NJLP establish a policy that failure to attend two State Board meetings per term shall constitute resignation from the State Board. FAILED (because resolution conflicts with the by-laws). E. Macron will contact absent State Board members. —RESOLVED, that the NJLP State Board approve the following by-laws amendments for submission to the Convention: 1) Create a new Article 3 titled Statement of Principles and Platform, to be inserted before the current Article 3, Membership (which will not be changed or deleted). The new Article 3: a.) The Statement of Principles affirms that philosophy upon which the New Jersey Libertarian Party is founded, by which it shall be sustained, and through which liberty shall prevail. The enduring importance of the Statement of principles requires that it may be amended only by a seven-eighths vote at the State Convention. b.) The New Jersey Party Platform shall

consist of the Statement of Principles and the implementation of those principles in the form of planks. 2) Add the following as the new section (b) to Article 12, Amendments [re-letter the old b. as c.]: Except for the Statement of Principles, as defined elsewhere, the New Jersey Libertarian Party Platform may be amended by a two-thirds vote at the State Convention. Written notice of the modifications proposed must be given to all members in accordance with notice requirements stated elsewhere in these By-laws. 3) Add a new Section 12.d. reading: Written notice of the proposed amendments to these By-laws, the Statement of Principles or the New Jersey Libertarian Party Platform planks shall include the proposed text deletions, insertions and additions. PASSED. —RESOLVED, that the NJLP Secretary be authorized to correct article and section designations, punctuation, and cross-references and to make such other technical and conforming changes as may be necessary to reflect the intent of the NJLP Convention in connection with any By-laws amendments. PASSED. **Platform committee.** The draft State platform is ready. RESOLVED, that the NJLP authorized up to \$300 for printing and mailing the draft platform to all members. PASSED. Anyone who has

comments is invited to attend the platform hearing Feb. 24 at Quarles' house.

CATV show. Buoncristiano and Pfeiffer will prepare a plan to have *A Third Point of View* shown throughout the state.

Newsletter. The January issue will be mailed by the 26th; the goal is to mail future issues by the 15th.

1996 Convention (Stefanelli) LP presidential candidates Schiff and Brown have confirmed that they will attend, as has Jorgensen, VP candidate. The flyer announcing the convention will be included in the Jan. issue of the newsletter.

Zhadanov action. Mr. Z, the 70 year old forfeiture victim, was removed from Allenwood Prison to a mental hospital in Kentucky when he announced his intention to go on a hunger strike. His plight has been mentioned in *National Review* and *Reason*. Paff will coordinate the effort to publicize his case.

Delegate selection procedures. RESOLVED, that the State Board recommend to the Convention that the delegate selection procedures approved by the NJLP Convention of March 4, 1989, be re-instituted. PASSED.

LP Platform Committee. RESOLVED, that E. Macron be appointed the NJLP's representative on the national platform committee. PASSED.

Tax Protest Day. Paff will obtain a price quote on "\$1 million bills" for distribution at post offices on April 15.

newsletters that lobby for the expenditure of funds. The Camden and Burlington county parties have merged. Mehaffey is the chair.

by the New Jersey Supreme Court in 1954. In *Abbott Dairies, Inc. v. Armstrong* (14 N.J. 319, 102 A.2d 372), the court held that "[t]he production and distribution of milk are intimately identified with the health and welfare of the people and the business is affected with a public interest warranting price and marketing regulations."

Kiddie PAC Forms in Cherry Hill

Editorial Page Editor:

The children of Cherry Hill school district have organized a political action committee to support candidates for school board seats. The children know, as we all should, that school boards control budgets which are generally larger than municipal budgets and must be funded by taxes



placed, for the most part, on property. Property taxes are generally paid for by parents and adults who own or lease property in the community.

The student children are concerned that cutbacks in historic revenue pools will cause reductions in the quality of educational programs or perhaps the actual elimination of low priority programs. The student children recognize that below the age of 18, they cannot address their desire to control tax expenditures to support their personal interests, because they cannot vote. And so, to date, they have raised over \$2,000 toward a goal of \$10,000, to support a slate of adults for the next school board election.

Discovering ways of voting yourself the use of your neighbors' property or money is a learned lesson that precedes Cherry Hill students' SLC-PAC by a few hundred years, and that's just our American experience. While some would criticize these students efforts to create funding for what they believe is a valuable service, the Burlington/Camden Libertarian Party suggests that we not only encourage these students' initial political activities, but that we actually support their efforts with a program that, regardless of their ability to vote, can allow them to participate in generating additional monies for their school programs.

First, Cherry Hill schools have 3,108 students in grades 9 through 12. As the SLC-PAC organizers have already proved by raising half their present \$2,000 in their PAC from students, these students do have the financial means to be politically active. This being the case, we encourage and strongly suggest that the students become full political citizens and tax themselves to support the programs they wish to fund.

Let's look at the presently untapped revenues that Cherry Hill high school students can use to demonstrate their desire to become responsible participating citizens in the redistribution of the community's assets.

3,108 high school students self-taxing themselves @\$10 (allowance) equals \$31,080 per week, times 52 weeks, equals \$1,616,160 for quality

school programs. In addition, at least 1000 or more students have automobiles, which could represent another self-taxing opportunity of perhaps, \$10 or \$20 per month, which could produce additional annual revenues of \$240,000.

With these two suggestions of personal commitment, Cherry Hill

students could raise additional revenues of \$1,856,160. for the school system.

They could invest in the same tax supported programs they seek to politically influence their parents and other citizens support through increased taxation.

Some may still wish to criticize students for getting involved in politics. The Libertarian Party does not. We prefer to assist high schools students to understand that voluntary associations are superior to the use of force, as in taxation, not only for funding what you believe is best for you, but also for the rest of society. It is said, "When the student is ready, the teacher will appear." We do not want that teacher to be professing "The ends justify the means." We do not need any more people teaching that might makes right.

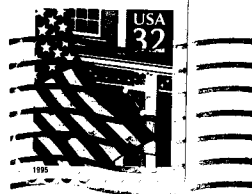
