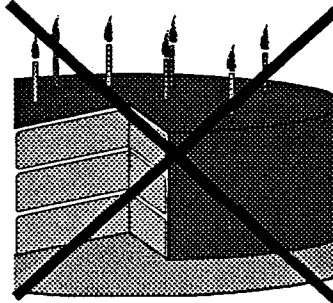
Carol Pong: Hello officer.

WASHINGTON, DC: A number of new surveys reveal a growing opportunity for the Libertarian Party to succeed in 1996 and beyond, said National Chairman Steve Dasbach today.

"Public opinion continues to move in our direction," he said.

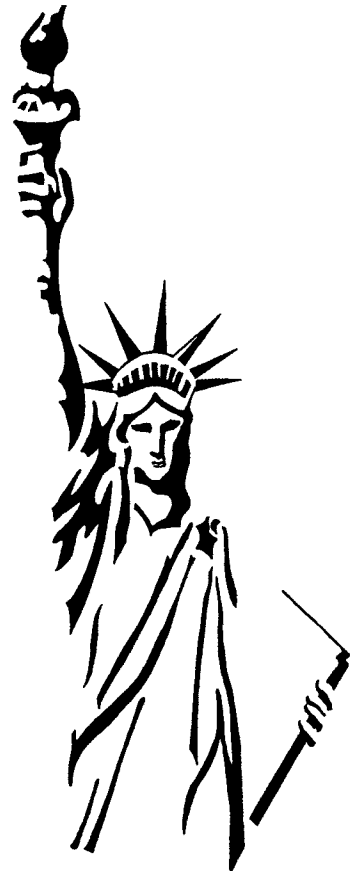
"Besides the growing libertarian sentiment among voters, these surveys also demonstrate an upsurge of distrust of government and an increased willingness to support third-party candidates. That's good news for us."

As evidence, Dasbach cited:

- A December 1995 questionnaire of PriceCostCo. customers, which revealed that 82% think America would be "better off with a third political party."
- A February poll of 18- to 30-year-olds by Youth Vote 96 -- a nonpartisan coalition of youth organizations -- which discovered that 67% would be "likely" to vote for a third-party candidate in November.

"The youth vote is up for grabs and the nation's twenty-somethings will base their decisions on issues, not party politics," wrote the Associated Press. According to the study, 48% of the 800 young people polled said a candidate's position on the issues would influence their vote, compared with 5% who said the political party would be the deciding factor.

- A January public opinion study by the Washington Post, which said that 75% of Americans no longer "trust the government in Washington to do the right thing most of the time."

LAW JOURNAL ARTICLE REVEALS "AMERICA'S MOST SECRETIVE COURT"

The February 26, 1996 New Jersey Law Journal (page 8, 143 N.J.L.J. 777) contains a story by Benjamin Wittes concerning the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court (FISA Court) which, according to the author, "operates like no other court in the land."

The court was created by the 1978 passage of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act and has handled 8,130 cases since then. The government has won each and every case.

The court is not a criminal court. It's purpose is to consider and grant requests from the Justice Department

asking for orders permitting the FBI, CIA and other agencies to conduct secret surveillance of people in the U.S. The targets of these investigations are not told of the court's involvement, and the public and press are not allowed to witness the court's proceedings or examine its records.

The court is made up of seven U.S. District Court judges who are flown into Washington every other Friday to hold court sessions.

In addition to the FISA Court, the 1978 act also created an appeals court to oversee it. However, that court has not met since its

formation in 1978, because targets of investigations aren't allowed to appeal and the government has never

lost a case. Judge Collins J. Seitz, a senior federal judge in Wilmington, DE, joked about his former job of

presiding judge of the appeals court. "My duties consisted of holding the title without functioning in any judicial way . . . It was sort of a joke."

According to the article, the "Counter-Terrorism Bill" passed by the Senate and currently in the House, would further expand the court's jurisdiction.

ACTIVIST'S CORNER

It's easy to get frustrated when you're a Libertarian; the perpetual stampede of voters seems to trample every freedom in their path while refusing to even consider the alternatives we offer, and our cause often takes on a hopeless look. This is borne out by what I call "the burnout cycle". People are thrilled when they find out what we stand for and join the Libertarian Party. Some of those who join feel motivated and try to get themselves or someone else elected to office, and discover that waging a winning campaign for state or federal office requires hundreds of people and thousands or even millions of dollars. This discovery often follows a period of intense effort and the disappointment and disillusionment are often enough to make them give up on the Libertarian Party.

While hundreds of these burned-out volunteers drift away, new members are joining, vowing to shake up the public and put The Evil Empire out of business, and the cycle begins again. So it goes, for the last twenty-four years, and yet to my amazement, the party I still growing! Clearly, the principles that the Libertarian Party stands for have an appeal that transcends demographic boundaries and election cycles. Millions of people want what we stand for, hundreds of thousands have discovered our party and tens of thousands have cared enough to join, and pay for the privilege!

Our cause is obviously worth fighting for, but we still haven't found the key to

make it work. How to solve this riddle? What can we do to get traction and end the burnout cycle? How can we get our candidates elected?

What we need are the tokens that make voters consider candidates credible. What makes voters take candidates serious? It is an amalgam of money, supporters, credentials, and a cause.

Let's review these one at a time.

- Money is the most obvious ingredient. It usually goes to those politicians who will

give it back with interest, after they take it from us. Obviously, Libertarians can't do that. But it's not hopeless, as Robert Heitner and Austin Lett have demonstrated. Both of these Libertarian Party candidates raised far more than their old party rivals for their campaigns. It took hard work, but it can be done.

- Supporters are an area where we can have an advantage. Conventional wisdom has I that people vote their pocketbooks. Think how many pocketbooks will get heavier if we get voted in. Republicrats buy a more loyal following, but our prospect list is much longer.

- The Cause is by far our strongest suit. No other political party has the intellectual and emotional

ammunition we have, and our cause becomes more imperative and popular with each day's growth in government's size.

- That leaves one ingredient in the recipe for election. The ingredient we have neglected more than any other: credentials. To make my point, a brief digression is in order.

When I ran for Freeholder in Sussex County in 1993, I appeared at a series of candidate forums. Neither my Republican nor Democratic opponent was a particularly inspiring speaker, and neither had any specific ideas. Neither had anything specific to offer, in fact, but a resume. The Republican described his long climb through school & planning boards, town council, mayor & fire commission, etc. it took him an entire three minute speech to list all his local activities. The Democrat had a much shorter list, but he also had served on the township committee. I gave a better speech than either, but I was long on ideas and short on accomplishments.

The local paper endorsed the Republican (surprise), but they examined the positions of the Democrat in detail, and clearly implied that he was a credible candidate. The same editorial dismissed me in half a sentence as someone who hadn't worked his way up and therefore deserved no consideration.

There's no sense raging against that editor; he was speaking for millions of our neighbors who simply won't take us seriously until and unless we prove our concern for our communities with time and sweat. We must acquire these credentials if we are ever to start getting elected.

Please don't misunderstand; those who serve as "paper candidates" for House and Senate, state Assembly and Governor, etc. are serving a valuable purpose; they notify the public or our party's existence, and occasionally score dramatic coups, as Don Ernsberger did in a televised debate for a US Senate race, or Janice Presser did by getting a newspaper endorsement for state assembly. However, neither got elected and only elected candidates get to make the kinds of changes we so desperately need.

To actually be taken seriously, we need people who have taken the time to serve on the unglamorous school and planning boards, township committees and advisory councils that normally launch a political career. We have traditionally neglected these areas because they are not where the critical decisions are made. But that's exactly the point; the public wants people who have endured these roles, just as the military wants people who have endured boot camp.

Government now consumes over half of what we produce, and the freedoms we still have make a much shorter list than those we've lost. Traditional politicians have no intention of reversing this situation. Only we understand the urgency of doing so. We must get elected to undo the mess, and the prerequisite is local community service.

You'd be amazed at how easy and painless it is to get started; I got appointed to my county's Solid Waste Advisory Commission and my town's Community Dispute Resolution

County committees. Pfeiffer will call an organizational meeting in Bergen county after the Convention. *Somerset/Middlesex* has a project in a kit available for challenging townships that use their newsletters to lobby for tax expenditures. *Monmouth* has invited all of the LP presidential candidates to a fundraiser the night before the Convention. **MOVED**,

that the Steering Committee create an "Activist's Corner" in the newsletter alerting members about public offices to seek, activities to undertake etc. **PASSED.**

Ongoing business and ad hoc committee reports:

1996 campaigns. Federal: the chairman will obtain Presidential and Senatorial petitions from ELEC, and call national about substituting names on Presidential petitions. Grindlinger is interested in running for Senate. Pfeiffer is seeking candidates for the 2d, 7th and 10th districts. The Steering Committee members present and Panella volunteered to be presidential electors. Local: **MOVED**, that the Steering Committee authorize the expenditure of not more than \$300 for a mailing to members and persons whose membership expired in 1995 urging that they run for public office. (Included with the mailing to lapsed members will be a renewal form and Convention announcement.) **PASSED.** **MOVED** that the Steering Committee develop a written formal plan by the end of Nov. 1996 for the 1997 elections and every year thereafter. **PASSED.**

Platform committee (Quarles) The platform has been mailed to the membership. Hearings will be held at Flynn's house at noon Feb.24. Members will vote on the platform at the Convention.

CATV show (Ellett). Steve Nagle will be the next guest. Martelle Green is interested

in having the show aired in Hudson county.

Newsletter. The deadline for the March issue is Feb. 26.

By-laws committee (Flynn) Proposed changes will be voted on at the Convention.

1996 Annual Convention (Stefanelli) Wiessman will prepare the award certificate for Moura.

Candidate development. Pfeiffer will meet with candidates to videotape and critique their public manner.

State House Office Committee (Pfeiffer) The committee has sent letters to the construction, health care and firearms-related industries soliciting funds. Wiessmann will offer to return members' contributions if \$40,000 has not been raised by March 1. (To date \$6160.48 has been donated.)

NJLP Web Page. D. Siano is merging Quarles' Web site into his.

Tax Protest Day. **MOVED** that the Steering Committee authorized the expenditure of \$250 for the purchase of 5,000 or more "\$1million bills" for distribution at post offices April 15. **PASSED.** Mehaffey will solicit the counties for orders of the \$1 million

bills" and Family Budget brochures.

New business:

Convention agenda. **MOVED**, that the Steering Committee approve the 1996 Convention agenda as amended. **PASSED.**

NJLP Budget. **MOVED**, that the Steering Committee adopt the 1996 budget of \$14,940. **PASSED.**

Announcements:

Mehaffey has no regular connection to E-mail.

Onlys Ds & Rs are permitted to work for the Board of Elections as district board members (and be paid \$100 per election day.)

The politically connected 66 year old NJ NY Conn Regional Plan Association has issued a dire report that unless there is the "political will" to raise \$150 billion via higher gas taxes, water bill surcharges and tolls that this may be the region's "final chapter" of prosperity.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:10pm.

a lot of bleeding hearts who popped corn over candles in their dorm rooms at college think our penalties for popcorn possession are excessive. They are not. to ensure the freshness and purity of food and...

KM: No! That is one of the common misconceptions promoted by extremists who are so dogmatic that they are willing to sacrifice our children to their narrow minded ideology. Safety was always the concern behind federal and state laws and behind agencies such as the FDA. Sure in the massively addicted America of the last century it took time to build the political support to bring many commonly used poisons under control, but safety was always the point. And nothing is more unsafe than sugar and fat. Far more people every year die from heart disease caused by improper diet than die from all narcotics and artificial stimulants

combined.

Subscriber: Klaus, this is Jerome. I'm with the NYPD. I must say it bothers me to have to waste my time on people who are doing what they want to do., There isn't enough jail space to hold muggers and burglars and carjackers because of all the pastry chefs and binge eaters. Violent criminals who are a real threat to other people are let back out on the street. Our job description says "Serve and Protect." Snacking remains a victimless crime.

KM: I can't believe I'm hearing this from a brother officer. Have you ever seen a family disrupted by sickness or death because of what some irresponsible parent shoves down his throat? What about kids unable to learn because they're all hyped up from the chocolate chip cookies they sneaked at lunch? It makes me puke to hear pastry use called a victimless crime.

prescription you or any citizen may buy whatever such foodstuffs are appropriate for you. Any honest manufacturer simply must sell only to licensed distributors who have the responsibility to screen customers, check prescriptions and keep careful records. We only want to bring the industry under sensible regulation.

Subscriber: Hello, this is Sue Packer from CAFE, the Coalition for A Fat free Environment. I just want to let you know that some of us appreciate everything you are doing to help preserve traditional American family values.

KM: Thanks, Sue. That's rewarding to hear.

CP: All right, you have heard the arguments. Now it is up to you, our subscribers, to decide whether the raid on this suspected pie den proceeds at this time. Please transmit your votes now.

... OK Klaus. The numbers are in. We have 54,348 in favor and 21,235 opposed. It looks like a go.....

Aren't these some great action shots we are getting from the helmetcam? You can see the risk these brave officers are taking as they break through each door not knowing what may be on the other side. It's hard to believe human beings can live in a

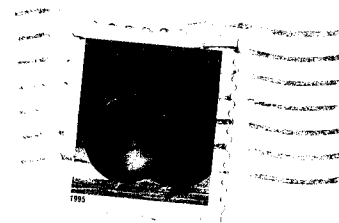
