1999 NJLP Convention

NJLP members Tom Wright, Joe Siano, Janice Presser, Mike Buoncristiano, and Mark Edgerton teamed up to organize the NJLP convention in Hightstown, Mercer County on Saturday, March 27. The event will be divided among three rooms at the National Conference Center of the Ramada Inn; an auditorium for the business meeting and guest speakers, a banquet hall for luncheon, and a separate display room for vendors and exhibitors.

The event will begin with the annual business meeting at 9am, at which the 1999 Steering Committee will be elected, a bylaws amendment proposal will be voted on, and an assortment of policy decisions will be made by the assembled membership. Admission to the business meeting is free of charge. Snacks and coffee will be provided courtesy of Mike Buoncristiano's firm, Avanti! Marketing Solutions.

The luncheon banquet will feature Congress of Racial Equality (CORE)

Wright professes to be "*honored that Roy Innis will attend, and I'm looking forward to hearing him.*" This will be followed by the keynote address by candidate for the LP presidential nomination Jacob Hornberger, whose theme will be "Libertarianism: The Hope for the Millenium." Wright said "*Jacob Hornberger alone is worth the price of admission.*"

The next speaker will be the NJLP's redoubtable attorney and constitutional scholar, Elizabeth Macron, who will discuss the separation of education and state. She will be followed by Tanya Kangas, Esq., an attorney for the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws (NORML). Mike Buoncristiano will wrap it up.

NAGLE'S HAT IN THE RING



Steve Nagle

NJLP member **Steve Nagle** has declared his candidacy for Belmar (Monmouth County) Borough Council. Nagle, a home improvement contractor, has already recruited campaign staff members: NJLP members **Jeff Pfeiffer** of Jackson Township (Ocean County), who will serve as Campaign Manager, and **Pat Bontempo** of Asbury Park.

Nagle plans to personally knock on the door of every registered voter in town during the campaign. Belmar has about 4000 registered voters, and about 60% of those with an affiliation are registered Democrats. The Council has five members, currently all Democrats. Steve intends to bill himself as "An independent voice on the Council."

Steve will have to file a petition with a minimum of approximately forty signatures in June or July. He says the campaign will require about two dozen volunteers on Election Day: twelve poll watchers (two for each precinct), six on the phones, and six voter chauffeurs. He ran for the post as a paper candidate without campaigning in 1996 and got 76 votes, for 3.5% of the vote.

NJLP TRUSTEE COVERED

NJLP Trustee **Ed Wiessmann** was quoted in a December 1 story in the *Daily Record* (Parsippany) and the *Courier News* (Bridgewater) covering the state legislature's proposal to toughen penalties for prostitution.

"By criminalizing prostitution, you are forcing people to go to those who are not tested," he was quoted as saying. Another quote from the story: "I challenge all the advocates of this law to name the victim (of this crime)."

GETZ COVERED IN NJ HERALD

National LP Press Secretary **George Getz** was quoted in a *New Jersey Herald* (Newton) front-page story on January 25 covering the U.S. government's threat to require banks to inquire of depositors where they got their money.

"This law would turn every bank teller into a government informer, and everyone with a bank account into a criminal suspect," was just one of the quotes of Getz. The reporter noted the opposition of the ACLU, and characterized this law's opponents' position as calling this the "prove you're not a criminal" rule.

NJLP HIRES NEW MEMBERSHIP COORDINATOR



The NJLP Steering Committee has hired **Jack Toussaint**, of Flanders in Mt Olive Township (Morris County) to take over maintenance of its database and management of membership from **Don Imbriale**, of Andover Township (Sussex County). The change will take effect on April 1.

Imbriale's work has resulted in an increase of 211 current dues-paying members of the NJLP between January 18, 1998, and December 31, 1998, from 783 to 994.

Imbriale has, without compensation, worked continuously to organize the NJLP's records and to bring system and order to its membership recruitment and renewal process since September 27, 1997. As a result, the NJLP has not only experienced membership growth of 27% in a year without high profile campaigns, it has enjoyed membership dues revenue roughly double the amount budgeted.

THE LADDER

Of the over half-million elective public offices in the United States, Libertarian Party members hold only a few hundred, all at the lowest levels. If we're going to see freedom restored in our own lifetimes, we need to fill many more of them soon.

But how? Many of us, like myself, (I ran for Sussex County Clerk in '92, and Freeholder in '93) have run for office repeatedly, without even approaching victory (I got six percent of the vote in '92, and five percent in '93). The NJLP slate for Congress last year averaged slightly over one percent of the vote. Even Murray Sabrin, for all the attention he got, received less than five percent. These results don't seem to correspond to the increasing respect our principles and policies are getting in the marketplace of ideas. What are we doing wrong? I believe many of us aim too high.

Except for some candidates who are famous for accomplishments outside of politics, most voters simply won't take a candidate seriously unless he or she has held lower office, and that office must not be too much lower.

But how much lower? Here's my answer: on the ten-rung-ladder of public office below, don't try to skip any rungs. If you haven't held public office yet, try to get your town or city council to appoint you to a minor office or committee. There are literally tens of thousands of these posts in New Jersey, and many of them go unfilled. Besides the planning & zoning boards listed below, there are many others. A few examples are playground commissions, court volunteers, and town cleanup committees. You'll have to inquire at town hall to find out which posts exist in your town. If no minor offices are vacant, join a civic group like the Rotary or Kiwanis, or volunteer for a charity like the Red Cross or ARC. The point is that you get active in a way that brings you into face-to-face contact with lots of your neighbors, and it's much more important that you succeed than that the success be prestigious.

I know that some people have skipped one or even several rungs on this ladder, but they are exceptions, and as members of a small party out of power we have a built-in disadvantage that rules out such exceptional consideration.

- 10) President or Vice-President of the US
- 9) President's cabinet or US Supreme Court Justice
- 8) Governor or US Senator
- 7) US House of Representatives, governor's cabinet, or state supreme court justice
- 6) Big city mayor, county sheriff, county prosecutor, county clerk, or appellate court judge
- 5) State legislature, medium city mayor, big city council, or superior court judge
- 4) Freeholder, mayor of a town, medium city council, municipal prosecutor, or municipal court judge
- 3) Municipal council or committee, school board, or locally prominent attorney
- 2) Planning board, zoning board, zoning board of adjustment, local organizer of a popular cause, or attorney
- 1) Local volunteer or activist, or licensed professional

SUCCESS IS WAITING

Editor:

As I looked through newspapers during the few days following Election Day 1998, I saw many municipal races which were uncontested. Earlier last year when the local school board elections were held, at least three people in Sussex County won seats on their school board as write-in candidates; one person "won" with just seven votes!

You can have an impact and raise our credibility by targeting these kinds of races. One of the advantages is that the electorate to be reached is significantly smaller than if running for a seat in the state legislature or US Congress. That means it takes less money and time to communicate to the voters. Dealing with a smaller area makes it easier to meet the voters in the district personally. It takes less time to flood the area with roadside signs and requires fewer signs, which helps to keep costs down. A mass mailing to all voters in the district will be smaller, hence less money and less time is needed to put it together.

By running for an office which would be otherwise uncontested, you actually have a chance of winning. You don't even necessarily have to run a good campaign to win — if something happens to the other candidate, or he or she screws up, victory is yours. You may even find an office for which no one else is running! In that case you instantly become the front runner and are almost assured of victory. Imagine that! A Libertarian elected to office in New Jersey!

And if you do win, it establishes your credentials for future races. Voters tend to put incumbents back into office, so you would have a good chance of being re-elected. Or, you could step up to the next higher level and point to your record in office as a qualification.

And if you do win at the lowest levels, and do a good job, and let your constituents know you are a Libertarian, they will realize that you're not some off-the-wall flake. That lends credibility to all other Libertarian candidates, making it that much easier for them to get elected.

So find one of these uncontested races in your town and throw your hat into the ring. Success is waiting.
